SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

March 13, 2013 - 9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Wednesday, March 13, 2013, at 9:00 A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Chairman Bruce Cannon called the meeting to order. Pastor Tim Boyd of the First Christian Church of Cowden said the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. John Warner was absent.

Following the roll call, Chairman Cannon thanked Yolanda Nation and the 4-H Federation representatives who treated the County Board to cinnamon rolls before the meeting. Jason Becker briefed the board on the activities planned to celebrate 4-H Week beginning March 16th.

Minutes for the February 13, 2013 board meeting were presented for approval. Mulholland moved to approve the minutes as presented. Wetherell seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote. (20 yes, 0 no)

Chairman Cannon announced that after 35 years of employment with Shelby County, Supervisor of Assessments Diana Wagner has decided to retire effective April 1, 2013. Mrs. Wagner recommended Marlene Waggoner be appointed to fill the vacancy left by her resignation. The vacancy was declared and Chairman Cannon appointed Marlene Waggoner to fill the unexpired term created by the resignation of Diana Wagner. Bennett made motion to approve the appointment of Marlene Waggoner as Shelby County Supervisor of Assessments, Robertson seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). County Clerk Fox administered the Oath to Mrs. Waggoner and she was congratulated on her appointment.

Kristie Warfel, CEFS Transportation Director, addressed the board to present Kristie Warfel, CEFS Transportation Director – Modification to the IDOT Section 5316 Job Access Reverse Commute CY 2013 Grant Application. Warfel explained to the board that this modification would separate Effingham and Shelby Counties. Kearney moved to approve the Job Access Reverse Commute CY 2013 Grant Application as presented. Hunter seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no).

County Treasurer Debbie Page requested approval from the board for a \$10.00 automation fee to be collected from tax buyers for parcels purchased at the annual tax sale, and help to protect the county legally. This fee will help to pay any costs related to the automation of property tax collections and delinquent property tax sales. Wetherell made the motion to approve the automation fee, Bennett seconded the motion which passed by voice vote (19 yes, Barr voting no).

Sheriff Mike Miller addressed the board to report that the Sheriff's Merit Commission on January 23, 2013 approved amending the Rules and Regulations reinstating the Sergeants' positions that had previously been repealed in 2006. Sheriff Miller explained that this change was made in order for him to promote deputies to the rank of Sergeant in the future should he feel the need. Attorney Liz Nohren, legal counsel for the Sheriff's Merit Commission answered questions from the board. Sheriff Miller also informed the board that he would like to reactivate the auxiliary deputy program and would be submitting a resolution for county board approval at the April meeting. Discussion followed. Mulholland made motion to approve the Sheriff's Merit Commission amendment as requested, Clark seconded this motion which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Copy of Amendment attached to these minutes).

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer presented the Highway Engineer's Report and a petition from the Village of Sigel for Replacement of a Bridge with Pipe and a Resolution to award road oil bids. Mr. Spesard updated the board that IDOT had recently awarded the contracts for both the Oklahoma and the Neoga Road Bridges and that the highway department would be making the Cold Mix to be used by the County and some of the Townships on March 26 and 27.

Wetherell made motion to approve the Petition from the Village of Sigel for replacement of a bridge with pipe. Simpson seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Petition attached to these minutes).

Robertson made motion to approve the Resolution to award the Road Oil bids to Howell Paving. Warren seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (19 yes, 0 no, Cruitt abstains). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

EMA Coordinator/Zoning Administrator Jared Rowcliffe highlighted the EMA/Zoning report previously mailed to the board for their review. (Report attached to these minutes). Mr. Rowcliffe presented for approval a Resolution to Rezone Property owned by Joshua Porter in Big Spring Township from AG to GB for Auto Repair Shop. This request has been reviewed and approved by both the Planning Commission and Board of Appeals. Discussion was held regarding the Hydraulic Fracturing Seminar that Rowcliffe attended along with Amling, Simpson and Warren recently in Springfield. IEMA has declared March Severe Weather Preparedness Month.

Strohl made motion to approve the Resolution to Rezone the Joshua Porter property in Big Spring Township from AG to GB. Behl seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Shelby County Board Meeting March 13, 2013

Chairman Cannon called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or for public awareness are as follows:

Public Buildings Chair Warren reported that the Circuit Clerk's office had another leak, and the roof would need to be repaired in the very near future. He also stated that the committee would be meeting next week to discuss the Courthouse roof repair, the CEFS design agreement with Gorski Reifsteck for design services for fixed facility at the property located at 1505 W. S. First Street, Shelbyville, as well as designating some handicapped parking spaces closer to the new entrance.

Legislative Committee Chair Amling stated that the Committee had come up with a schedule for county board members to provide a person or minister of their choosing to provide prayer for the meetings through the end of the year, and the Clerk's office would be mailing this schedule in the near future. Discussion was held. Amling reported the committee had met with Dove and Dove regarding the Ameren Transmission Line that has the potential to impact Shelby County landowners and would like to present a resolution at the April meeting expressing Shelby County's support for the original Ameren route. Amling also said the committee has recommended that Assistant State's Attorney Marvin Hanson be the Ethics Committee Advisor, and will seek approval for this as well as the forming of an Ethics Commission at the April 2013 meeting.

Insurance Chair Bennett said she would have the County's insurance carrier look into liability associated with auxiliary officers.

Chairman Cannon made the following committee appointments:

Richard Hayden to replace John Warner on the Public Health Committee Fred Killam, Board of Appeals Bruce Steinke, Board of Appeals to replace Phillip Strohl who resigned Dave Young, Sheriffs Merit Commission

Clark made motion to approve Chairman Cannon's appointments. Mulholland seconded said motion which passed by voice vote (19 yes, Bennett no)

There was no correspondence to report to the board and no public body comment

At this time, Steve Melega, Public Health Administrator reported to the board that Public Hearings would be held for the proposed amendments to the Private Sewage Disposal Code. These meetings are scheduled for March 26, 2013 at the Illinois State Fair Grounds in Springfield.

Robert Jordan reported that former Shelby County Board member Marvin Jordan had passed away.

There was no further business to come before the Shelby County Board.

Clark made motion to assess mileage and per diem for the March meetings, to pay the bills/payroll as approved by the committees and adjourn until the next regular meeting to be held on April 10, 2013. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (20 yes, 0 no) and the meeting was adjourned at 10:20 A.M.





Illinois Compiled Statutes

ILCS Listing Public Acts Search Guide Disclaimer

Information maintained by the Legislative Reference Bureau

Updating the database of the Illinois Compiled Statutes (ILCS) is an ongoing process. Recent laws may not yet be included in the ILCS database, but they are found on this site as <u>Public Acts</u> soon after they become law. For information concerning the relationship between statutes and Public Acts, refer to the <u>Guide</u>.

Because the statute database is maintained primarily for legislative drafting purposes, statutory changes are sometimes included in the statute database before they take effect. If the source note at the end of a Section of the statutes includes a Public Act that has not yet taken effect, the version of the law that is currently in effect may have already been removed from the database and you should refer to that Public Act to see the changes made to the current law.

(35 ILCS 200/21-245)

Sec. 21-245. Automation fee. The county collector in all counties may assess to the purchaser of property for delinquent taxes an automation fee of not more than \$10 per parcel. In counties with less than 3,000,000 inhabitants:

- (a) The fee shall be paid at the time of the purchase if the record keeping system used for processing the delinquent property tax sales is automated or has been approved for automation by the county board. The fee shall be collected in the same manner as other fees or costs.
- (b) Fees collected under this Section shall be retained by the county treasurer in a fund designated as the Tax Sale Automation Fund. The fund shall be audited by the county auditor. The county board, with the approval of the county treasurer, shall make expenditures from the fund (1) to pay any costs related to the automation of property tax collections and delinquent property tax sales, including the cost of hardware, software, research and development, and personnel and (2) to defray the cost of providing electronic access to property tax collection records and delinquent tax sale records.



Managers Report

Rep. Lang calls for permanent tax hike

On Wednesday, Deputy Majority Leader Lou Lang (D-Skokie) called for the two-year old temporary income tax hike to become permanent as a way to shrink a \$96 billion deficit in five state retirement systems. The income tax increase is due to expire at the end of 2014.

House Bill 2375 would also increase the retirement age to 67 and increase employee contributions by 3 percentage points. Since 2011, new state employees must work until age 67 before retiring, while current employees may retire at 60 with full benefits after eight years of state work.

Lang's legislation does not call for any reduction in pension benefits, however, it does shift downstate teacher pension costs to local school districts. It also does not end business tax breaks as proposed by public employee unions.

In addition to **House Bill** 2375, three other pension reform proposals are on the table: **Senate Bill 1** (Cullerton), **House Bill 98** (Nekritz) and **Senate Bill 35** (Biss).

Illinois House members spent most of the week in committees; the Senate was not in session and will return to Springfield on February 27. At this time, we are tracking over 300 bills that may impact counties directly. This Statehouse report provides a summary of key legislation in committees and new bills introduced since the last report. The list is not all inclusive, nor it is a roster of bills favored or opposed by the association. If you have questions regarding any legislation, please contact our office at 217-528-5331.

House Bills

HB 59 (Hays) ELEVATOR SAFETY ACT

Status: Tabled

Excluding Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, and Will, allows any other county and any municipality that lies within, to set up its own inspection system for elevators and lifts by local ordinance.

HB 89 (Franks) PROPERTY TAX – FALLING EAV Status: House Revenue Committee

Amends the Property Tax Extension Limitation Law (PTELL) to freeze property taxes during years of declining assessments.

HB 90 (Franks) HOMESTEAD PROTECTION

Status: House Revenue Committee
Authorizes counties to establish a homestead protection program under which the
county treasurer may make payments
from the indemnity fund to pay the delinquent taxes on the primary residence of
eligible taxpayers.

HB 95 (McSweeney) PTELL – EXTENSION LIMITATION Status: House Revenue Committee

Freezes property tax levies for a threeyear period. Under current law, property tax extensions in non-home rule counties are effectively capped by the rise in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). HB 95 would reset the formula to ensure a 0% property tax levy increase.

HB 126 (Gordon-Booth) SCAVENGER SALES

Status: House Rules Committee

Amends the Property Tax Code concerning scavenger sales. Provides that any taxing district in which the property is located (instead of the county only) may bid as trustee for all taxing districts and no cash need be paid.

HB 168 (Kay) TELECOMM TOWERS


Status: Counties & Townships Comm. Amends the Counties Code. Provides that a facility shall not be approved by the county board or constructed in an unincorporated area within 1,000 feet of a municipal jurisdiction boundary except where the facility has already been authorized by an annexation agreement with such municipality.

HB 943 (Yingling) FOIA – GOVT. ASSOCIATIONS

Status: State Govt. Admin. Committee Amends the Freedom of Information Act. Specifies that the term "public body" includes any association of units of local government or any not-for-profit corporation with membership consisting of units of local government.

HB 945 (Yingling)

RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT Status: Counties & Townships Comm. Provides that rural fire protection districts shall be governed by an elected, rather than an appointed, board of trustees consisting of 5 members with 4 year terms.



Bill advances to adjust early voting

The employees of Illinois' election authorities will be spending the Easter holiday with their families instead of their co-workers if legislation filed by Rep. Renee Kosel (R-New Lenox) and Republican Leader Tom Cross (R-Oswego) continues to advance.

House Bill 1560 would exempt election authorities from staying open for early voting on the Easter holidays, while providing additional voting hours during the last week of early voting. It also requires notice be given to the State Board of Elections of any closure and public notice for the subsequent extended hours. The bill passed unanimously out of the Executive Committee Wednesday.

Sales tax borrowing

Senate Bill 622 arrived in the House after being approved by the Executive Committee earlier this week. The bill as amended calls for the transfer of \$6.2 million from the Local Government Tax Fund in order to fund the regulation of medical professionals. The State would then be required by statute to repay the amount of that transfer over the next three years by making three payments of \$2.2 million from the Illinois State Medical Disciplinary Fund to the Local Government Tax Fund.

HB 956 (Moffitt) COUNTIES CODE – SOLICITATION Status: House 2nd Reading

Requires the charitable organization seeking an exemption from the prohibition on charitable solicitation to also provide the county with a list of 3 alternate solicitation locations.

HB 961 (DeLuca) LOCAL GOVT. DISTRIBUTIVE FUND Status: House Revenue Committee Provides that from each income tax payment the Department of Revenue receives it must deposit certain amounts directly into the Local Government Distributive Fund.

HB 983 (McSweeney) ALTERNATIVE REVENUE BONDS Status: Cities & Villages Committee Imposes new limits on alternative revenue bonds. Provides that a petition to initiate a backdoor referendum concerning the issuance of bonds may be filed within 90 (instead of 30) days of publication of the authorizing ordinance and notice. It must be signed by 5% of the registered voters or 500 registered

HB 994 (Tracy) FIRE PROTECTION – IMMUNITY Status: House Judiciary Committee Amends the Local Governmental and Governmental Employees Tort Immunity Act. Expands the term "local public entity" to include a private person, organization, or corporation, that provides support to a fire department, fire protection district, or rescue squad during an emergency when activated at

the request of the fire chief, fire protec-

tion district, or rescue squad district.

HB 1008 (Sandack) FOID – FIREARM TAX

Status: House Judiciary Committee
Provides that a unit of local government
may not impose any tax, fee, or other
assessment other than the normal
sales tax rate for goods, on any
firearms, attachments or ammunition.

HB 1020 (Mayfield)
COUNTIES CODE – DEMOLITION
Status: House 2nd Reading
Concerning the expedited removal of
certain buildings that are a continuing

hazard to the community, repeals the requirement for a building to be residential and 2 stories or less in height.

HB 1024 (Beiser) FIREARM OWNERS ID

Status: House Judiciary Committee
Provides that a county may not regulate
firearms or impose greater restrictions
on the acquisition, possession, transportation, carrying, and transfer of
firearms, attachments and ammunition.

HB 1037 (Tryon) FARMLAND PRESERVATION

Status: Counties & Townships Comm. Provides that Boone, DeKalb, DuPage, Grundy, Kane, Kankakee, Kendall, Lake, McHenry, and Will county may levy an annual tax for farmland preservation and green development purposes.

HB 1039 (Tryon) PROPERTY TAX BILLS – PENSIONS

Status: House Revenue Committee
Provides that each property tax bill shall
contain a separate statement for each of
the taxing districts setting forth the dollar
amount of tax due that will be used by
the taxing district to pick up or otherwise
pay its employees' contributions to a
public pension fund.

HB 1045 (Franks) LOCAL GOVT. CONSOLIDATION Status: House 2nd Reading Extends the final report data of the Loc

Extends the final report date of the Local Government Consolidation Commission to September 30, 2013.

HB 1051 (Bradley) CRIMINAL CODE – FIREARMS

Status: House Judiciary Committee Provides that a unit of local government may not regulate the transportation of firearms and ammunition, components, or accessories for firearms.

HB 1053 (Sullivan, Jr.) PROPERTY TAX – OPEN SPACE Status: House Revenue Committee

Provides that land containing hotels or lodging facilities, club houses, banquet facilities, tennis or other courts, swimming pools, commercial or industrial facilities, retail shops, or land and parking areas serving any of those improvements shall be valued at its fair cash value and not as open space land.

HB 1142 (Cassidy) UNWANTED FIREARMS

Status: House Judiciary Committee
Provides that each county shall establish
a program that allows individuals to turn
in unwanted firearms. Requires implementation without reimbursement.

HB 1193 (Berrios)
INCOME TAX ACT – OFFICIALS
Status: House Revenue Committee
Provides that, within 60 days after the
Dept. of Revenue or Illinois Independent
Tax Tribunal issues a final decision that
any elected official has failed to file a
return required under the Act or failed to
pay all or a portion of the tax due, that
elected official must either pay all such
delinquent amounts, together with any
penalties, or resign from elective office.

HB 1198 (Sosnowski) COUNTIES CODE – ZONING Status: Counties & Townships Comm.

Provides that a special use may be passed at a county board meeting by a simple majority of the elected county board members, unless requirements for a written protest against the proposed special use are met. In those cases, a vote of three-fourths of all the members of the county board is required. **Note:** Would allow a small number of landowners to force County Boards to a 3/4 vote on any special use permit.

HB 1201 (Sosnowski)
MUNICIPAL CODE – WIND FARMS
Status: Cities & Villages Committee

Amends the Illinois Municipal Code. Provides that a municipality may prohibit any electric generating wind device from locating less than 1,400 feet from a residence within its corporate limits. **Note:** Such a ban would extend into unincorporated county lands.

HB 1248 (Gordon-Booth) ELECTION CODE – SUPERCEDING COUNTY BOARD

Status: House Executive Committee Amends the Election Code. Permits the establishment of a county board of election commissioners, by referendum initiated by the county board, in a county with a population of less than 200,000 but more than 175,000 persons that has a municipality with a municipal board of election commissioners.

Bradley introduces fracking regulation bill

Rep. John Bradley (D-Marion) has filed a bill as chief sponsor that regulates hydraulic fracturing in Illinois. **House Bill 2615** establishes Illinois Department of Natural Resources as the regulatory agency to issue permits, enforce the Act, and adopt rules. Fracking has taken place in Illinois for decades, but has remained largely unregulated. Proponents say the fracking industry will create jobs in Illinois, while opponents say the lack of regulation has resulted in incidents of pollution and contamination.



Fracking is the process of extracting natural gas from shale rock layers deep within the earth. The industry is eyeing southern Illinois' New Albany shale deposits. Among other provisions, **House Bill 2615** prohibits high volume horizontal hydraulic fracturing operations performed without a permit and regulates where fracking operations are proposed, planned, or occurring may be located. It also provides requirements for permit applications, insurance, water-quality monitoring, enforcement and penalties.

House Bill 2615 has bi-partisan support and a good chance of passing as it was negotiated by officials from industry, environmentalists, agriculture, and Attorney General Lisa Madigan. Co-sponsors include Reps. David Reis, Mike Bost, Naomi Jakobsson, Ann Williams, Mike Fortner, Michael Tryon, Wayne Rosenthal, Brad Halbrook, David McSweeney, John Cavaletto, Charles Meier, Adam Brown, Pam Roth, Dwight Kay, Jil Tracy, Norine Hammond, Chad Hays, David Harris, C.D. Davidsmeyer, Josh Harms, Dennis Reboletti, Jeanne Ives, Patricia Bellock, Joe Sosnowski and John Cabello.

New House Bills

HB 1259 (Fortner)
IMRF SELF MANAGED FUND
Status: House Rules Committee

Allows participants in the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF) to elect to participate in a self-managed program of retirement benefits instead of the program of traditional retirement benefits currently offered.

HB 1269 (Fortner) ELECTIONS CODE

Status: House Executive Committee With respect to nomination petitions for independent candidates to appear on the general election ballot, makes the minimum signature requirement the same as that for an established party candidate seeking the same office (now, a higher minimum), permits circulation not more than 75 (now, 90) days before the filing deadline, and makes the filing deadline 75 days after the general primary (now, between 141 and 134 days before the general election).

HB 1278 (Senger)
PTELL – AGGREGATE EXTENSION

Status: House Revenue Committee Amends the Property Tax Extension Limitation Law. Provides that, for levy years 2014 and later, the taxing district's aggregate extension base is the greater of (A) the taxing district's last preceding aggregate extension limit or (B) the taxing district's last preceding aggregate extension, subject to adjustments for taxing districts in 2 or more counties, merged or consolidated taxing districts, and adjustments by a rate increase or decrease factor. Provides that the term "aggregate extension limit" means the district's last preceding aggregate extension if the taxing district had utilized the maximum limiting rate permitted without referendum.

HB 1282 (Senger)
PREVAILING WAGE ACT
Status: House Labor Committee

Excludes from the scope of the Act the removal of trees and limbs along roadways and parkways when that work is not part of other construction.

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HB 1307 (Roth) PROPERTY TAX ALLOCATION ACT Status: House Rules Committee

Concerning economic development project costs, exempts certain ad valorem tax rebates for economic development project areas that are located in Grundy County from being considered in the sum total of all reasonable or necessary costs incurred by the county incidental to an economic development project.

HB 1405 (Bradley) COUNTIES CODE – SPECIAL FUNDS

Status: Counties & Townships Comm. Provides that in a county that maintains a countywide map through a GIS, a charge may be added to specified filing fees in order to defray the cost of providing automated access, in addition to electronic access, to the county's GIS or property records. Also provides that amounts from the Animal Control Fund may be used to aid in costs incurred for enforcement of the Act or any county or municipal ordinance relating to public health and public nuisances, in addition to animal control.

HB 1444 (Zalewski) IMRF – AMORTIZATION

Status: House Pensions Committee
Provides that the Board shall determine
the amortization period to be used in calculating the amount to be contributed by
participating municipalities and participat-

ing instrumentalities in order to adjust for changes in the Fund's unfunded accrued liabilities. The amortization period shall not exceed 30 years for municipalities or 10 years instrumentalities.

HB 1484 (Currie)

CHICAGO TEACHER COST SHIFT Status: House Pensions Committee

Amends the Chicago Teacher Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Shifts future funding responsibility from the Chicago Board of Education to the State.

HB 1485 (Mautino)

TITANIUM METALS DEVELOPMENT

Status: House Revenue Committee
Creates the Illinois Titanium Powdered
Metals Development Advisory Committee within DCEO. The Committee shall
assist with the growth and development
of the titanium powdered metals industry and creation of a consortium or center that conducts and supports titanium
powdered metals research, promotion,
and marketing activities in the State.

HB 1490 (Kay)

PUBLIC LABOR RELATIONS ACT Status: State Govt. Admin. Comm.

Provides that arbitration panels hearing security employee, peace officer, fire-fighter, and paramedic disputes must not take into consideration the ability of a unit of government to raise taxes or impose new taxes when determining the financial ability of that unit of government to pay the costs associated with those employees' wages and other conditions of employment.

HB 1496 (Kay) PTELL – VOTER REFERENDA

Status: House Revenue Committee
Provides that, in a county that is not
subject to the Law, the registered voters may file a petition with the county
clerk requesting the county board to
submit to the voters of the county the
question of whether to make all nonhome rule taxing districts that have all
or a portion of their EAV situated in the
county subject to the Law. If 10% of the
voters sign the petition, then the county

HB 1513 (Bost) FIREARMS – LOCAL REGULATION

board shall submit the question.

Status: House Judiciary Committee Provides that any existing or future local ordinances or resolutions imposing any registration requirement on firearms are invalid or void.

The Seventh U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has denied Attorney General Lisa Madigan's request for a full hearing on the issue of right to carry. The Court, by a 6-4 vote, declined to revisit the December ruling by a three-judge panel ordering the state legislature to join 49 other states in allowing citizens some form of right to carry guns in public. Madigan must now decide whether to drop the case or appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

HB 1521 (Cabello) PROPERTY TAX LEVY REDUCTION

Status: House Revenue Committee
Provides that, beginning in taxable year
2013 and concluding in 2017, the county
clerk shall reduce the property taxes
levied by each taxing district to a level
that is not greater than that district's levy
in the previous year. The clerk may
increase or decrease the portion of a
total tax levy, provided that it is based
solely on a change in the EAV of the
taxpayer's property.

HB 1588 (Currie) COUNTIES RECORDING FEES

Status: House Rules Committee
Establishes a \$1 per document recording
fee for certain filers for any document
that affects an interest in real property
other than documents which solely
relate to an easement for water, sewer,
electricity, or other public service. \$0.50
of the \$1 fee shall be deposited in the
Recorder's Automation Fund and may
not be expended for any other purpose.

HB 2233 (Sosnowski) OPEN MEETINGS ACT

Status: House Rules Committee

Deletes a provision that authorized a public body to hold closed meetings to consider collective negotiating matters between it and its employees or their representatives, or deliberations concerning salary schedules for one or more classes of employees.

HB 2326 (Chapa LaVia) FOIA – COMMERCIAL PURPOSE

Status: House Rules Committee
Makes several changes to the Freedom
of Information Act including allowing
public bodies to charge a fee for the
cost of materials, equipment, and personnel used to copy or produce a record
in response to a request made for a
commercial purpose. Also authorizes a
fee to be charged for the first 50 pages
of copies requested and for paper used
to create an electronic record.

HB 2327 (Riley)

COURT DOCUMENT STORAGE

Status: House Rules Committee
Authorizes county boards to require the circuit court clerk to charge and collect a court automation fee of up to \$25 (instead of \$15) and a court document fee of up to \$25 (instead of \$15).

Senate Bills

SB 41 (Munoz) PROPERTY TAX CODE

Status: Senate Revenue Committee Allows the chief county assessment officer to record a tax lien against property that was granted one or more erroneous homestead exemptions.

SB 1158 (Steans) TRUCK FLEET FEES

Status: Senate Executive Committee Imposes a \$40 per vehicle fee statewide on anyone registering 10 or more vehicles of specified types. Fees would be deposited into an alternative fuels fund.

SB 1222 (Murphy) LOCAL GOVT. EMPLOYEE RAISE Status: Senate Labor Committee

Counties, Townships and Municipalities would be required to hold a public hearing, before increasing the pay of any officer or employee by more than six percent a year.

SB 1224 (Murphy) PENSION CODE – NO SICK Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Ends the practice of using unused vacation and sick time to increase pension benefits or to establish service credit.

SB 1228 (Link)

PROPERTY TAX CODE – COUNSEL Status: Senate Revenue Committee

With respect to tax objection complaints, provides that the custodian of the funds for each taxing district that may be affected by the complaint has the right to representation by counsel of it's own choosing and is not required to accept representation by the State's Attorney.

SB 1253 (Holmes) OCCUPATIONAL DISEASES

Status: Senate Insurance Committee

Creates a legal presumption that any firefighter who develops Parkinson's disease is presumed to have developed the disease as a result of his or her employment. This would likely cause a significant increase in workers' compensation costs for local governments and goes against recent reform efforts that have sought to assure that injuries are actually linked to an employee's work.

FY14 Budget Address delayed to March 6

Current law requires the Governor to present his budget and make a budget address to the General Assembly and the people of Illinois on the third Wednesday in February, which in 2013 is February 20. A bill with partisan sponsorship, **House Bill 156**, was enacted to enable the Governor, for one year only, to delay this key speech until March 6. Gov. Quinn signed the bill into law on February 19, as the second law of the 98th General Assembly (Public Act

February 19, as the second law of the 98th General Assembly (Public Act 98-2). The State's ongoing budget crisis is blamed by observers for forcing the chief executive to demand more time to write and present this essential planning document. Pension costs, unionized employee pay and benefits, health care, and other exponentially increasing spending lines are creating a widening picture of unsustainability for the State's overall strategy of levying taxes, borrowing money, and spending appropriated funds.

New Senate Bills

SB 1302 (Althoff) UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ACT Status: Senate Assignments

Provides that the term "employment" does not include service performed after December 31, 2013 in the employ of certain governmental entities if the service is performed on a temporary basis as a public safety employee and the pay received for the service during the calendar quarter is less than \$1,000.

SB 1341 (Lightford) OPEN SPACE LAND

Status: Senate Agriculture Committee Provides that a local government defined as "distressed" under criteria adopted by the Department of Natural Resources shall be eligible for assistance up to 90% (rather than 50%) for the acquisition of open space lands and for capital development and improvement proposals, provided that no more than 10% of the amount appropriated under this Act in any fiscal year is made available as grants to distressed local governments.

SB 1403 (Noland) PROPERTY TAX CODE – PROTESTS Status: Senate Revenue Committee Provides that, if a taxpayer objects to al

Provides that, if a taxpayer objects to all or any part of a property tax for any year based on an assessment, the taxpayer may elect to (i) pay all of the tax due or (ii) pay the amount of tax due for the year for which a tax objection complaint will be filed in compliance with Section 23-10, minus the amount attributable to any portion of the amount of the reduction in assessed value. Contains provisions concerning notice and penalties.

SB 1404 (Haine)

PROPERTY TAX – JUDGMENT SALE Status: Senate Revenue Committee

Provides that notices of application for judgment and sale may be sent by first class mail (instead of registered or certified mail).

SB 1405 (Martinez)

LOCAL TAX COLLECTION OFFSETS Status: Senate Revenue Committee Amends the Local Tax Collection Act.

Provides that the amount to be paid to each municipality or county under the Act shall not include credit memoranda and shall not include the following amounts: (i) an amount equal to the amount of refunds made during the second preceding calendar month by the Department on behalf of such county or municipality; (ii) an amount the Department determines is necessary to offset any amounts which were erroneously paid to a different taxing body; and (iii) any amount which the Department determines is necessary to offset any amounts which are payable to a different taxing body but were erroneously paid to the municipality or county.

"Illinois' aging gas lines are a real public safety hazard," said
Senator Dave Koehler. "And it's only going to get worse the longer
we go without replacing them. Today, I've taken the first step by proposing
legislation that will give gas distributors the tools they need to begin
upgrading Illinois' pipelines."

Koehler proposes gas upgrade plan

Illinois has nearly 2,000 miles of cast- and wrought-iron gas mains – many more than 60 years old. The federal government has identified these aging gas lines as a major public safety risk and issued a call to action to replace them as soon as possible.

According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, Illinois had 27 gas incidents caused by old, substandard gas lines between 2002 and 2011. Though the state had no fatalities, there were several injuries and more than \$7 million in property damage during this time period.

Senate Bill 1665 sponsored by Senator Dave Koehler (D-Peoria) will make it easier for gas distributors to recover the cost of natural gas pipeline upgrades, making Illinois more competitive with neighboring states like Indiana, Missouri and Kentucky, which already have similar laws. It also enables gas companies to move gas meters to the outside of buildings and install modern tracking technology, reducing the need for manual meter readings and cutting customer costs. Outdoor meters make it easier for firefighters to shut off gas mains during emergencies.

The Illinois Commerce Commission keeps its strong oversight and review powers under the Gas Upgrade plan and gains new authority to penalize gas distribution companies if they don't meet annual performance and transparency goals.

Illinois Senate approves rules change

A rules change approved in the Senate, **Senate Resolution 54**, will allow citizens who collect 10 or more signatures for a legislative proposal to have their ideas submitted to the Senate. The proposals for new laws would be reviewed by a special Senate committee for possible consideration as legislation. Sponsored by Senate President John Cullerton (D-Chicago), SR 54 passed on a vote of 57-0.




Nursing home care disclosure

The bill aims to protect a nursing home residents' funds by requiring facilities at the time of admission to provide each resident or resident's guardian with a written statement explaining to the resident their obligation to comply with the asset and income disclosure requirements of the federal Social Security Act. Failure to comply with asset and income disclosure requirements may result in the denial of Medicaid eligibility.

Raoul to lead concealed carry negotiations

Senator Kwame Raoul (D-Chicago) filed legislation on February 5 that will become a negotiated concealed carry proposal. Senate President Cullerton designated Raoul to bring together all voices in the gun debate to develop a legislative response to Judge Richard Posner's December ruling, which set a 180-day deadline for action. Language drafted in the course of negotiations will be added to **Senate Bill 1337**. The Illinois General Assembly has until June 9, 2013, to change the law.

Sandack, Cross unveil new transparency initiatives

Reps. Ron Sandack (R-Downers Grove) and Tom Cross (R-Oswego) unveiled a three-point set of transparency initiatives to make state and local government more accountable to taxpayers. The goal is to provide every property taxpayer with an annual itemized breakdown of the spending outlays they are billed for to support units of local government; including school districts, municipalities, library and park districts, community colleges and more.

Transparency initiatives would include provisions to:

- Expand the Illinois Transparency Portal (ITAP) (House Bill 1555) to include all taxing bodies, levies and debts; including pension and retiree health care liabilities and government spending in Illinois;
- Require a State Debt Impact Note (House Bill 1556) be prepared on all legislation to tax, spend or generate revenue, such as levies and fees;
- Create an Illinois Review Board (House Bill 1557) to evaluate the taxes, spending, and debt of each taxing body and require the Board to publish the findings for taxpayer review.



Rep. David Reis (R-Olney) joined other downstate lawmakers on Friday to announce a preliminary framework agreement on regulatory standards for hydraulic fracking. "Today's agreement protects the environment yet promotes investment and exploration of new natural resources. This industry will create much needed jobs and economic activity for Southern and Southeastern Illinois and the state as a whole," said Reis who served as the chief House Republican negotiator on the contentious issue.

Crundwell scandel inspires anti-corruption bills

Prison is where Rita Crundwell will be for a long time and the ex-Dixon Comptroller's massive theft has sparked new legislation to prevent similar crimes in the future. Rep. Tom Demmer (R-Rochelle) grew up in Dixon and Crundwell's nearly \$54 million theft frustrated him, so he put it into writing; a set of anti-corruption bills that will soon go to committees for discussion.

The three-bill "Dixon Package" was filed on February 13th. House Bill 1562 would require two signatures to open a county or municipal account. It would also require the county board to review the books kept by the county treasurer twice a year. This is because in Crundwell's case, she faked nearly 160 State invoices. The second bill, House Bill 1561, increases the penalty for forgery to a

Class 2 felony (3 to 7 years) when the forged document appears to be a governmental invoice or receipt. The third measure, House Bill 1563, would increase the severity of a felony charge based on how much money is stolen.

Crundwell was sentenced on February 14 to 191/2 years in prison for misappropriation of funds totaling an estimated \$53 million against the taxpayers of Dixon, a small city in northwestern Illinois.

New Senate Bills continued

SB 1418 (Hunter) HYDRAULIC FRACTURING BAN Status: Senate Assignments

Imposes a moratorium on the process of hydraulic fracturing in Illinois to allow two years for a science-based investigative task force to study the issue.

SB 1430 (Syverson) COUNTIES CODE – BORROWING

Status: Senate Local Govt. Committee Provides that the county board may borrow money for county purposes from one fund for the use of another fund, as long as it is repaid within the current fiscal year; and may borrow money from any financial institution, provided that the money shall be repaid within 10 years.

SB 1431 (Syverson) COUNTY BOARD MEMBERS Status: Senate Assignments

Authorizes a county board member in any county (now, in a county having fewer than 40,000 inhabitants) to concurrently hold the office of member of the board of education, regional board of school trustees, board of school directors, board of a community college district, or board of school inspectors.

SB 1432 (Collins) LOCAL PROPERTY REHAB

Status: Senate Revenue Committee
Provides that property owned by an entity created by county or municipal ordinance for purpose of acquiring troubled
property and returning it to productive
use is exempt from property taxation.

SB 1469 (Sullivan) WIND ENERGY FACILITY Status: Senate Energy Committee

Requires an operator of a commercial wind energy facility on land owned by another to enter into an agricultural impact mitigation agreement with the Department of Agriculture. Provides that the operator is responsible for deconstruction of a wind energy facility.

SB 1493 (Link)

HORSE RACING LOCAL PAYMENTS Status: Senate Executive Committee

Provides that payments of a percentage of the pari-mutuel handle from an inter-

Moffitt files legislation to aid 911 funding with cellphone tax

Calls to local law enforcement and emergency personnel have increased dramatically in recent years, due in part to increased cell phone use. However, funding has not kept pace. As landline numbers continue to dwindle, placing some county call centers on the brink of closing, Rep. Don Moffitt (R-Galesburg) decided to act. He filed **House Bill 1212** that would raise cellular device charges to \$1.00 dollar per month, up from the current 73 cents. It requires

the State Treasurer to deposit \$.80 per surcharge into the Wireless Service Emergency Fund for distribution to the 9-1-1 authorities. The 911 Act was to expire April 1, but has been extended to July 1, 2013.

track wagering location licensee to the municipality and county in which it is located must be paid by the licensee on a monthly basis no later than the 10th of the month following the month such handle was generated.

SB 1519 (Connelly) TOOL AND DIE ABATEMENT

Status: Senate Revenue Committee Allows any taxing district to order the county clerk to abate all or a portion of the taxes levied by the taxing district on certain tool and die business property.

SB 1533 (Rose) FIREARMS – LOCAL REGULATION Status: Senate Assignments

Provides that a local government may not require registration, reporting of the sale or transfer of a firearm, or may not keep a firearms registry.

SB 1593 (Rose) ENTERPRISE ZONE ACT Status: Senate Assignments

Provides that, in calendar year 2013, DCEO may certify an additional 10 Enterprise Zones in counties with a population of less than 50,000.

SB 1669 (Althoff) PREVAILING WAGE ACT Status: Senate Assignments

Provides that by passage of a resolution, a county, municipality, school district, or township may exempt all local public works projects undertaken from the requirements of the Act.

SB 1679 (Link)

LINE OF DUTY COMPENSATION ACT Status: Senate Assignments

Includes court security officers in the definition of "law enforcement officer".

SB 1692 (Althoff) OPEN MEETINGS – ASSOCIATIONS Status: Senate Assignments

Amends the Open Meetings Act and the Freedom of Information Act. Specifies, in both Acts, that the term "public body" includes any association of units of local government, any not-for-profit corporation with membership consisting of units of local government, or any other entity with members consisting of units of local government irrespective of whether the entity is organized pursuant to the Illinois Constitution or other law of this State.

LGDF in jeopardy once again!

Although this comes as no surprise, plans are now being discussed in Springfield that would TAKE AWAY ADDITION-AL REVENUES from counties. We have confirmed reports that the Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF) is again being discussed as a potential source for lawmakers to use in order to balance the state budget. It appears that the Governor's office and some legislators are supportive of either reducing (\$240 million) or "capping" LGDF for FY2014. The negative impacts of such a choice would be profound.

LGDF revenue is NOT the State's money. It has always been provided to counties and municipalities since the income tax was instituted in 1969. The State collects the money on behalf of local governments for efficiency. State legislators must understand that cutting millions from cities and counties affects every Illinois citizen. Please contact your Representatives and Senators and let them know that you OPPOSE the decreased LGDF.

This statehouse report provides an overview of House and Senate committee and floor actions on legislation that may impact county government. Throughout the report, we have identified several bills for which we need our membership to take action. This list is not all-inclusive. Senate Committee Action

The following bills have passed committee and arrived in the Senate.

SB 1341 (Lightford) OPEN SPACE LAND GRANTS Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Allows local governments defined as "distressed" by the Department of Natural Resources to be eligible to receive a 90% reimbursement (now 50%) for acquisition of open space lands, capital development and improvement proposals. This would be accomplished by specifying 10% of total money used for OSLAD grants be directed to distressed local governments.

SB 1404 (Haine) PROPERT TAX – JUDGMENT SALE Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Changes the notification requirements for judgment and sale of tax delinquent properties. Notices could be sent by first class mail, rather than by registered or certified

mail. Although the bill was approved by committee, the sponsor agreed to work on changes to the measure before moving forward.

SB 1430 (Syverson) COUNTIES BORROWING MONEY Status: Senate 3rd Reading

Allows a county to borrow from a local bank instead of having to use a tax anticipation warrant as long as the funds are repaid within two years. This was requested by Winnebago County as a way to save taxpayer's money because they believe they can borrow short term more cheaply from a bank rather than issues a tax anticipation warrant.

SB 1471 (Holmes) LOCAL GOVT CONSOLIDATION Status: Senate 3rd Reading


Extends the filing date that the Local Government Consolidation Commission must submit its report to the General Assembly to September 20, 2013.

Sales tax borrowing bills passes



Senate Bill 622 sponsored by Senate President John Cullerton (D-Chicago) and House Speaker Michael Madigan (D-Chicago) has passed both Houses and now heads to the Governor's desk. The bill borrows \$6.6 million from the Local Government Tax Fund (sales tax revenue) in order to fund a medical regulatory unit within the Illinois Dept. of Financial and Professional Regulation. The money would be used to rehire staff to expedite the licensing process for doctors. The bill calls for the money to be repaid in three installments of \$2.2 million. IACBMC along with other local government organizations are skeptical that the funds will actually be replaced and don't see why local governments are once again footing the bill to fix a state created problem.

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Drone legislation introduced

Whether drones are in use in Illinois today is unclear. Police departments aren't required to disclose ownership of the small, remotely piloted devices used primarily for video surveillance. Sen. Daniel Biss (D-Evanston) has introduced legislation that would change that. The Federal Aviation Administration recently lifted its own regulations on domestic law enforcement drones, and twenty states are considering stepping into the gap, either by imposing a moratorium on the technology or by limiting its use.

Senate Bill 1587, called the Freedom from Drone Surveillance Act, permits the use of a drone by a law enforcement agency if it is attempting to locate a missing person and is not undertaking a criminal investigation or if the agency is using the drone solely for crime scene photography.

SB 1534 (Rose) DEFERRED COMP – ROTH IRA Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Allows for state employees in the deferred compensation plan to also participate in Roth IRA plans.
Additionally, instructs CMS and local governments to amend their plans to allow designated Roth IRA contributions and in-plan rollovers to designated Roth accounts.

SB 1657 (Holmes) BOARD OF REVIEW AFFILIATIONS Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Provides that no more than two members of a board of review shall be affiliated with the same political party.

SB 1674 (Collins) FORECLOSURE FEE REFUND Status: Senate 2nd Reading

This is a follow-up measure clarifying provisions of an expedited foreclosure bill approved in 2012. It affects collections, fees, processes, and time frames for clerks of courts and the borrower.

SB 1679 (Link) / SB 1748 (Noland) LINE OF DUTY – COURT SECURITY Status: Senate 2nd reading

These are identical bills that include court security officers in the definition of the term "law enforcement officer." Law enforcement officers get compensation if they are killed in the line of duty, this will now extend to court security officers.

SB 1795 (Martinez) HOUSING RECORDING FEES Status: Senate 2nd Reading

This bill was introduced in response to legal action regarding the constitutionality of how the Rental Housing Support

Program fees are collected. Under the bill, the recording of any document relating to real property will be charged \$1, with fifty cents of the fee deposited into the County General Revenue Fund and fifty cent deposited in the Recorder's Automation Fund. The Recorder will collect \$9 (now \$10) for the Rental Housing Support Program State surcharge on any real estate related document.

SB 1812 (Link) DEMAND DEPOSIT ACCOUNTS Status: Senate 2nd Reading

In addition to other investments permitted by law, allows any treasurers and custodians of funds to deposit funds into demand deposit accounts.

SB 1824 (Sullivan) LOCAL MEMORIAL MAINTENANCE Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Addresses an issue in current law wherein local governments may by ordinance construct memorials, but can not appropriate funds for this maintenance. This bill addresses this situation by allowing counties to appropriate funds to maintain veterans' memorials that are erected; by allowing townships and municipalities to allocate funds for the maintenance of memorials through proposition, and Park Districts that lease land for the use of a memorial may transfer the maintenance of the memorial to the organization holding the lease.

SB 1843 (Mulroe) COUNTY INMATE TRANSFER Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Seeks to ensure that the correct county is reimbursed for the fees associated with the transfer of a juvenile offender by defining "transfer case" in the Probation and Probation Officers Act.

SB 1846 (Mulroe) COURT PRO BONO PROGRAM Status: Senate 2nd Reading

Intended to simplify the process for identifying which low-income clients are eligible to have their court fees waived by eliminating unnecessary and duplicative court hearings. Instead they will be able to use the current streamlined process used by legal service agencies. The goal is to improve the administration of justice in the courts and improve efficiency for overburdened legal aid organizations.

Medical marijuana bill approved

On Wednesday, the House Human Services Committee passed legislation by an 11-4 vote to legalize medical marijuana in Illinois. Under **House Bill 1**, medical marijuana use would only be allowed to patients with quaifying conditions, such as cancer, multiple sclerosis and HIV. Rep. Lou Lang (D-Skokie), the bill's sponsor, is optimistic this version will pass as it includes tighter regulations than past failed measures. "This is clearly model legislation for the country if we pass it," said Lang. The Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police and Illinois Sheriffs' Association are officially opposed.

Senate Bills in the House

These bills have passed the Senate and arrived in the House.

SB 10 (Steans) Harris MARRIAGE FAIRNESS ACT Status: House 2nd Reading

Creates the Religious Freedom and Marriage Fairness Act. Provides all laws of this State applicable to marriage apply equally to marriages of same-sex and different-sex couples and their children.

SB 48 (Martinez) Soto REPEAL PUBLIC ACT 92-876

Status: House Rules Committee
Repeals the Unified Child Support
Services Act. Healthcare and Family
Services proposed this bill and contend
that State's Attorneys are not utilizing the
unified services program. It was never
used because no county was able to
fulfill all of the requirements to enter into
the contract.

SB 104 (Althoff) Franks MINIMUM WAGE LAW – OVERTIME Status: House Rules Committee

Provides that overtime compensation provisions do not apply to any employee who is a member of a bargaining unit recognized by the Illinois Labor Relations Board and whose union has contractually agreed to an alternate shift schedule as allowed by specified provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938.

Democrats push forward to ban assault weapons

The Illinois House on Tuesday voted in favor of bans on semi-automatic assault weapons and large-capacity ammunition magazines, though the proposals still face contentious battles before they could become law. The House must approve the full piece of legislation for it to move to the Senate. Republican legislators in the Illinois House refused to cast votes.

Resolution to abolish Lt. Governor position approved by committee

Illinois voters may have the opportunity to decide whether the state should have a Lieutenant Governor. Rep. David McSweeney (R-Barrington Hills) filed House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment (HJRCA 18) as chief sponsor, a measure that would abolish the post as part of his effort for greater government efficiencies. McSweeney has garnered bipartisan support, including 28 additional house members to sign on as

co-sponsors. Rep. Jack Franks (D-Marengo) and Leader Tom Cross (R-Oswego) are the chief co-sponsors of the legislation. McSweeney's legislation passed the State Government Committee by a vote of 16-4.

According to House Republican staff, the state could save approximately \$2 million a year by doing away with the office. "I urge my colleagues to join me and get this done," added McSweeney. "A meaningful budget cut to the bureaucracy is a great start to prove that we're serious about cutting spending." If HJRCA 18 is approved, it would be placed on the 2014 ballot for voters to decide. Under the legislation, the Attorney General would be next in line to assume the duties of Governor if necessary.

New internet gambling legislation introduced

A new gaming bill is making its way through the Illinois Senate. **Senate Bill 1739** sponsored by Sen. Terry Link (D-Gurnee) would expand land-based gambling options and also introduce internet gambling. The legislation comes just 48 hours after Governor Quinn vetoed a similar bill that would have authorized a casino in Chicago.



Senate Bill 1739 includes the authorization of a Chicago casino; slot machines at horse racing tracks and at O'Hare and Midway airports in Chicago; four new casinos outside Chicago (one each in Rockford, Danville, the Chicago south suburbs and Lake County); legalized internet gambling (iGaming); and a ban on political contributions by those holding gambling licenses. Under the bill, all riverboats may become land based and new boats/casinos can be land based as well.

Unlike previous gaming bills, **Senate Bill 1739** creates a new Division of Internet Gaming under the Department of the Lottery. The Division shall be charged with the administration, regulation and oversight of Internet-based gaming (iGaming) which allows wagering on casino-based games, including poker. The revenues and fees will be used to fund the Illinois Gaming Board, pay old bills, provide a local share to communities where the facilities are located, and, ultimately, provide funding to the Education Assistance Fund, which will also be used to pay teacher pension costs.

The Senate Executive Committee approved the bill on a 10-4-1 vote. It now goes before the full Senate.

Concealed-carry debate continues

The gun debate in Illinois is proving to be one of the most contentious issues facing lawmakers this session. The appellate ruling has started the clock ticking. The General Assembly has until June 9, 2013 to pass a concealed-carry proposal.

Illinois House votes to cap pensions

In a preliminary vote Tuesday, Illinois House members voted 65-7 in favor of an amendment that would cap a state retiree's pensionable salary to what is called the Social Security wage base, now at \$113,700, adjusted annually for inflation. It was the first time a pension proposal has been approved in the House in two weeks' of test votes on reform measures. However, the votes are just a prelude to next week, when comprehensive pension bills are expected to be considered in both House and Senate committees.

The move is estimated to save \$632 million in fiscal year 2014 staring July 1, which is small when considering the \$96.8 billion shortfall of full pension funding. Republicans boycotted the vote as they did last week on other proposals.



House Committee Actions

The following bills have passed committee and arrived in the House.

HB 22 (Flowers) AIDS VACCINE

Status: House 2nd Reading

Amends the Counties Code. Provides that group and individual policies of accident and health insurance and managed care plans must provide coverage for a vaccine for acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) that is approved for marketing by the federal Food and Drug Administration and that is recommended by the U.S. Public Health Service.

HB 1201 (Sosnowski) WIND FARMS

Status: House 3rd Reading

Amends the Illinois Municipal Code. Provides that a municipality may prohibit any electric generating wind device from locating within its corporate limits. This shall apply only to devices permitted after the effective date of the amendatory Act.

HB 1203 (Sosnowski) PROPERTY LEGAL DESCRIPTION Status: House 3rd Reading

Amends the Counties Code. Provides that the notice required for a text or map amendment shall not include a metes and bounds legal description of the property affected, provided that the notice includes the common street address or addresses and property index number ("PIN") of all the parcels of real property contained in the affected area.

HB 1233 (Sacia) HOSPICE PROGRAM LIMIT Status: House 2nd Reading

Amends the Hospice Program Licensing Act. Provides that on and after the effective date of the amendatory Act, the number of licensed hospice residences shall not exceed the following: (i) five hospice residences located in counties with a population of 700,000 or more; (ii) five hospice residences located in counties with a population of 200,000 or more but less than 700,000; and (iii) five hospice residences located in counties with a population of less than 200,000.

HB 1256 (Gordon-Booth) FLASHING YELLOW SIGNALS Status: House 2nd Reading

This bill is intended to improve traffic flow at lights with flashing yellow arrows. Requires vehicles facing a flashing yellow arrow indication to proceed only as indicated by the arrow and to yield the right of way to other vehicles. Pedestrians must give the right of way to vehicles lawfully within the intersection at the time the flashing yellow signal is first displayed.

HB 1444 (Zalewski) IMRF AMORTIZATION Status: House 3rd Reading

Provides that the Board shall determine the amortization period to be used in calculating the amount to be contributed by participating municipalities and participating instrumentalities in order to adjust for changes in the Fund's unfunded accrued liabilities. The amortization period shall not exceed 30 years for municipalities or 10 years for instrumentalities. Allows participating employees to withdraw additional contributions only to the extent permitted by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

HB 1457 (Bradley) NURSING HOME CARE ACT Status: House 2nd Reading

Provides that to protect a residents' funds, a facility shall place any monthly allowance to which a resident is entitled in that resident's personal account, or give it to the resident, unless the facility has written authorization from the resident or the resident's guardian (now, the resident or the resident's guardian or if the resident is a minor, his parent) to handle it differently.

BILL PASSES TO ADJUST EARLY VOTING: House Bill 1560 has passed both Houses. If signed by the Governor, it will exempt election authorities from staying open for early voting on the Easter holidays, while providing additional voting hours during the last week of early voting.

New House Bills

HB 2396 (Sosnowski)
ELECTIONS – HOME RULE BALLOT
Status: House Executive Committee
Provides referendum language to cease
being a home rule unit of local government.

HB 2404 (Currie) JUVENILE DELINQUENCY AGE Status: House Judiciary Committee Changes the definition of delinquent minor to include a person who was under 18 (rather than 17) years of age when he/she committed an offense classified as a felony.

HB 2460 (Arroyo) ROAD FUND APPROPRIATION Status: House Rules Committee Beginning with FY 2014, all Road Fund Monies shall be appropriated to provide 50% to DOT District 1 and 50% to be divided among the remaining districts.

HB 2481 (Reboletti) LOCAL GOVERNMENT REDUCTION Status: Counties & Townships Comm.

Amends the Counties Code. Adds a Division addressing local government reduction and efficiency. Provides the General Assembly's findings regarding units of local government and possible inefficiencies. Provides that in certain counties, the county board may enact an ordinance proposing the dissolution of a unit of local government and, upon the effective date of that ordinance, the chairman of the county board shall issue an audit of the unit. Following the return of this audit report, the county board may adopt an ordinance to dissolve the unit.

HB 2482 (Cabello) COUNTY CODE – STATEMENTS Status: Counties & Townships Comm.

Requires the annual budget to contain a detailed statement showing any bonuses or increase in any salary, wage, stipend, or other form of compensation for every agency, department, or any other entity receiving an appropriation from the county.

HB 2489 (Phelps) COUNTY ROAD FUNDS

Status: House Transportation Comm. Extends the time counties have to obligate funds allocated to them under the Illinois Highway Code by 24 months.

Sosnowski: "Open the door on union arbitration hearings"

Rep. Joe Sosnowski (R-Belvidere) is fighting for increased transparency during labor contract arbitrations by introducing legislation aimed at eliminating the ability for government entities to negotiate labor contracts behind closed doors.

Rockford Mayor Larry Morrissey says the plan will benefit taxpayers in Rockford and around the state. "In these binding and mandatory arbitrations, witnesses give testimony under oath, decisions are

made by an unelected arbitrator, and taxpayers are often forced to pay huge salary and benefit increases," says Morrissey. "There is no excuse for this work being done in the dark. Our City Council could never do this. Everyone, including arbitrators, should be subject to the Open Meetings Act so the public can see their work and hold the process accountable."

House Bill 2233, which has been referred to the State Government Administration Committee, would remove the state statute that authorizes a public body to hold closed door meetings to consider collective bargaining agreements or deliberate salary schedules for a class of employees.

HB 2505 (Soto) CLERKS OF COURTS FEES Status: House Executive Comm.

Amends the Clerks of Courts Act. Provides that unless an amount or percentage is otherwise provided by statute, for fines, fees, and costs collected and disbursed by the Circuit Court Clerk pursuant to statute, the county board may require the Circuit Court Clerk in its county to retain not less than 1% nor more than 5% for deposit in the Circuit Court Clerk Operation and Administrative Fund.

HB 2615 (Bradley) HYDRAULIC FRACTURING ACT Status: House Revenue Committee

Creates the Illinois Hydraulic Fracturing Regulatory Act. Prohibits high volume horizontal hydraulic fracturing operations performed without a permit. Regulates where high volume horizontal hydraulic fracturing operations are proposed, planned, or occurring may be located.

HB 3105 (Sosnowski) VIDEO GAMING ACT

Status: House Rules CommitteeProvides that the governing body of a municipality or a county board of a county in which video gaming has not

been prohibited may pass an ordinance to limit the number of video gaming terminals permitted to operate and place restrictions on the locations of the video gaming terminals.

HB 3293 (Sente) COUNTY OFFICIAL STIPENDS Status: House Rules Committee

Provides that assessors, county treasurers, coroners, sheriffs, recorders of deeds, clerks of the circuit court, and other county officers whose terms of office begin on or after the effective date of the amendatory Act shall not receive a stipend.

HB 3393 (Cabello) ILLINOIS INCOME TAX ACT Status: House Rule Committee

Provides that, if the rate of tax is reduced because the State has exceeded the State spending limit, then, beginning with the first distribution to occur after the effective date of the reduction, the State Comptroller shall order transferred and the State Treasurer shall transfer each month from the General Revenue Fund to the Local Government Distributive Fund an amount equal to 1/10 of the net revenue realized under Act during the preceding month.

MAJORITY REPORT: News from the Democrat Caucuses



"These two great campuses deserve to have an equal say in their governance," Senator Bill Haine said. "A geographical balance on the board of trustees has been generally accepted by past administrations. This bill simply codifies that balance."

Haine bill restructures SIU board and ensures balance

Senator Bill Haine (D–Alton) introduced legislation that would reconstitute Southern Illinois University's board of trustees. **Senate Bill 2406** would create new rules affecting the makeup of the board that oversees the SIU's Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses.


The current board is made up of eight voting members: seven appointed by the governor and one student selected by the student body. There is one additional non-voting student representative. The new bill would require that, of the seven gubernatorial appointed board members, three of the appointees must be graduates of SIU Carbondale and three must be graduates of SIU Edwardsville. It would also extend voting privileges to the second student representative.

The rule requiring the board to be balanced between alumni from the two campuses is based on a prior informal practice. The new bill would formalize the process and insure that each campus have equal representation. If **Senate Bill 2406** is passed and signed by the governor, then all current trustees would need to be reappointed. The bill is currently awaiting assignment to a Senate committee.

Jurisdiction of Thomson prison to federal government passes Senate

The sale of Thomson Correctional Center is one step closer to being reality. Senate Bill 30, which passed the Senate on March 1, allows the state to grant jurisdiction of the prison to the federal government.

"Unfortunately, this process has taken years.



The Thomson correctional facility, built in 2001, cost the state \$140 million dollars to construct; however, it has never been operational because the state lacked the funds to open the facility. The Justice Department agreed to purchase Thomson in October of 2012 for \$165 million. Once operational, the facility should provide over 1,000 jobs in Northwestern Illinois.




Cullerton reacts to budget address


Senate President John Cullerton released the following statement regarding Governor Pat Quinn's FY14 Budget Address: "Today, Governor Quinn introduced a plan that appears balanced and holds the line on spending. I appreciate that his plan also reflects our true liabilities in entitlements and pensions. This year another \$1 billion pension payment diverts our attention from every other budget priority. The inescapable truth is the enormity of our pension costs continues to crowd out essential services. Nowhere is that more evident than in education. Because of rising pension costs, the Governor's budget understandably includes painful cuts.



However, we should all consider this an unacceptable option and work to fully restore education funding. This reality reinforces why pension reform remains my top priority this session. For that reason I have notified all pension reform senate sponsors to present their bills before the Senate Executive Committee within a week."



MINORITY REPORT: News from the Republican Caucuses



State Senators Kyle McCarter (R-Lebanon), Dave Luechtefeld (R-Okawville) and Sam McCann (R-Carlinville) met with Department of Corrections Director S.A. Godinez and his top management team on Wednesday, February 27 about problems in the state's correctional system.

"We had a very direct discussion with Director Godinez, said McCarter. "What we are looking for is a comprehensive plan to stabilize the situation in our prisons. Given the extent of over-crowding, due to closures like Tamms, we must make sure that our correctional officers (CO) are not put in dangerous positions."

Inmate attacks on CO's are a serious concern. Inmate on inmate assaults have also increased which adds to the challenges facing CO's to keep order in the prisons.

"Given the state's poor financial condition, and the impact the facility closures will have on both staff and inmates, we have to monitor the situation very closely," said McCann.

Financial challenges facing the correctional system were addressed, specifically the issue of costly overtime, which is about \$45 million annually. Commitments to hire people for secretarial positions were also discussed, which will allow DOC to move CO's back into security. DOC did promise weekly reports on efforts to balance staffing, eliminate overtime and save money in the department.

"The Director stood firm in his defense of the closure of Tamms Correctional Center, segregation policies, and some staffing issues, stated Luechtefeld. "The Department



did agree with us in our conclusion to get more clerical staff hired, to ensure that security staff are not bogged down with paperwork and are allowed to concentrate on security duties."

"This is not where the discussion with Corrections ends, added McCarter. "My colleagues and I will remain vigilant and hold the Director and his management team accountable."

Bost opposes cell phone ban



Rep. Mike Bost (R-Murphysboro) voted against the cellphone ban approved on March 1 by the Illinois House. "Banning the use of cellphones while driving is nothing but government being the ultimate big brother," said Bost. "What's next? Banning the use of pens and paper or listening to music in the car? Our government

needs to stay out of our personal lives and focus on governing not dictating."

House Bill 1247 provides that a person may not operate a motor vehicle on a roadway while using a cellphone. The cellphone ban will allow drivers to use hands-free devices such as Bluetooth headsets.

Bivins works with Comptroller to protect students

Sen. Tim Bivins (R-Dixon) pledged his support for legislation proposed by State Comptroller Judy Baar Topinka (at right) to protect Illinois students by removing polling places from public and private schools. Sen. Bivins and State Rep. Jack Franks (D-Woodstock) will sponsor the legislation in the General Assembly. The two lawmakers and the Comptroller were joined at a State Capitol press conference March 5 by representatives from the Police Benevolent and Protective Association, the Illinois Chiefs of Police Association, and several sheriff's departments.

Bivins has also introduced a school-safety legislative package (**Senate Bills 1931, 1932, 1933**) with ideas ranging from architectural standards for school building construction to a School Crime Watch program.



House Bills in the Senate

These bills have passed the House and arrived in the Senate.

HB 956 (Moffitt) Mulroe COUNTIES CODE – SOLICITATION Status: Senate Assignments

Requires the charitable organization seeking an exemption from the prohibition on charitable solicitation to provide the county with a list of 3 alternate solicitation locations. If the county determines that the applicant's location cannot be permitted due to significant safety concerns, such as high traffic volumes, poor geometrics, construction or past accident history, then the county may deny the application for that location and must approve one of the 3 alternate locations following the order of preference submitted by the applicant on the alternate location list.

HB 984 (Mautino) Martinez RECORD FEES

Status: Senate Assignments

Amends the Clerks of Courts Act. Provides that certain fees imposed for automated record keeping shall be paid by the defendant upon a judgment of guilty or grant of supervision for a violation (instead of "conservation violation") under certain Acts.

HB 1020 (Mayfield) Link BUILDING DEMOLITION Status: Senate Assignments

Amends the Counties Code. Concerning the expedited removal of certain buildings that are a continuing hazard to the community, repeals the requirement for a building to be residential and 2 stories or less in height.

While some of the details of these bills differ, the general concept of each is to prevent tax-capped local governments from collecting revenue that is sufficient to cover their costs. This would affect not only counties, but also municipalities, townships, schools, and other units of government that are subject to the Property Tax Extension Limitation Law (PTELL). Currently under the tax-cap statute, the extension limitation (what is essentially the "tax cap") may be increased each year by the amount of either 5% or the increase in the Consumer Price Index – whichever is less. The purpose of this increase is to allow the capped taxes to keep up with rising costs due to inflation. Under these bills, the extension limitation could not be increased at all despite any increase in inflation.

- The bills set a State policy that says that the revenues of a community should not be sufficient to meet its costs. The minimal CPI-increase permitted by PTELL is designed only to allow local governments to cover inflationary increases in expenses. Counties would be forced to further cut essential services.
- Local governments have already faced cuts through decreased tax revenues. For years, local governments have responded to this dour economic situation by cutting costs and services in order to balance their budgets. A further reduction in revenue would prevent local governments from being able to provide services at even the reduced levels that have become the new norm.
- The reduction under each of these bills does not just apply if EAV decreases it will become a permanent part of the tax rate. Because PTELL caps growth when EAV's rise, the reduction in a district's tax base would be long term. A district would not fully recover these revenue reductions as the economy improves.
- Many local governments spend the majority of their property-tax levy on pension contributions. Already the state statutes require higher contributions than counties are allowed to tax for. These bills would just make the problem worse.

Carlyle Lake State Fish and Wildlife Area has Record Breaking Waterfowl Seasons

Carlyle Lake State Fish and Wildlife Area certainly lived up to its reputation as one of the finest waterfowling spots in the Midwest this past hunting season. With 8,483 hunters taking 11,601 ducks during the 60 day regular duck season, Nov. 10 through Jan. 8, this year was the third highest harvest on record at the site.

was an all time record harvest for this special hunting season. This was followed by the Youth Duck Hunt held one week prior to regular duck season. During this two day weekend hunt, only hunters 15 years old or younger, are allowed to hunt while accompanied by a non-hunting adult. A total of This record setting pace started earlier with the sixteen day Early Teal Season in September, when 990 hunters took 1,446 Blue-Wing and Green-Wing Teal, the earliest migrating ducks. This 186 youth took part in this hunt and a total of 481 ducks were harvested. At 2.59 ducks per hunter, this was an excellent success rate, especially for young waterfowlers.



2011 4-H National Youth Science Day Innovation Awards

Congratulations to the 2011 Toyota Innovation Award winners! This year three 4-H. National Youth Science Day events earned awards for their creativity, their ability to build momentum around their Wired for Wind events, and their commitment to community impact. To learn more about the winners, read their stories below.

\$4,000 Creativity Award Winner

O University of Illinois Extension, Unit 19

On October 5, 2011, 75 fourth graders form Cumberland Elementary School visited Lake Land College campus where they spent three hours conducting the Wired for Wind experiment, led by Lake Land College technology division instructors.

During part of one experiment, youth designed, decorated, and tested their blades. The instructors demonstrated the need for clear paths for the wind. The youth learned they got better results when the turbines were separated a little as opposed to bunched up in a group. One work group heavily colored their blades with markers, in effect waxing their blades, so there was less surface friction between the paper and the wind. The result was a slightly higher voltage reading than the other work groups.

The students were also provided a greater perspective on renewable energy when they visited a working turbine and a set of solar panels. Discussions during this portion of event centered on renewable energy and how Lake Land College is using solar panels, geothermal technology, and new wind turbines to grow their renewable energy sources. Other topics/activities included: transforming energy, terawatts, surface friction, blade size vs. rotational speed, and renewable energy/





These sources of funding include county boards, donations, state matching funds, federal funds, state general revenue funds and user fees. Funding from county boards and donations are matched by the State of Illinois in the so called state matching funds. These funds are expended delivering educational and youth development programs in the counties mentioned above. The expenditures include salaries and office operations. The tables below breakdown of the funds received and the expenditures by their source.
