SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING

February 8, 2017-9:00 A.M.

The Shelby County Board met on Wednesday, February 8, 2017 at $9:00\,$ A.M. at the Courthouse in Shelbyville, Illinois.

Prior to calling the meeting to order, Chairman Cruitt introduced Bradford Rau, the new Public Defender, to the Board.

Chairman Cruitt called the meeting to order, Pastor Wade Helmkamp of the Holy Cross Lutheran Church gave the prayer and all present recited the Pledge of Allegiance. The Board wished Pastor Helmkamp well as he plans on retiring in July after serving the community for 22 years.

County Clerk Jessica Fox called the roll. Mulholland and Wetherell were absent. Cannon was tardy.

Minutes for the January 11, 2017 board meeting were presented for approval. Lenz made motion to approve the minutes as presented. Bennett seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Dean Kaufman, a 14 year old student from Stewardson was introduced to the Board by Chairman Cruitt. Kaufman has created a prototype flag for Shelby County and explained its meaning to the Board. The background color of green represents the importance of agriculture in the county, the blue diagonal strip represents the water resources of the river and lake, the 24 stars represent the townships, the outline of Shelby County is shown so people would know what County the flag is for and the red star is for the County seat of Shelbyville. Kaufman was given a round of applause by the County Board.

Chairman Cruitt requested approval for the County to participate in the sponsorship of the CEO program in conjunction with Shelby County Economic Development by pledging \$1,000 a year for the next 3 years. This money will be paid out of the County board dues line item, which recently received a \$1,900 reimbursement from UCCI. No tax dollars will be used for these sponsorships.

Amling made motion to approve the sponsorship for the CEO program. Drnjevic seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Bruce Steinke thanked the board for their support of the CEO program.

Next Chairman Cruitt requested the Board pledge a one-time \$500 cost share with the City of Shelbyville to participate in the Vista Program with Western Illinois University. This program will work with Shelby County Partners to do various projects in the County and will assist Economic Development.

Kearney made motion to approve the pledge for the Vista Program. Cannon seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Legislative Committee Chair Amling informed the Board the committee met January 17th to review the closed meeting minutes from July 13, 2016. The committee felt that since this issue had now been discussed in open meeting these minutes should be opened.

Amling made motion to open the Closed meeting minutes from July 13, 2016. Williams seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

County Farm Committee Chairman Robert Jordan presented the County Farm Lease for the next year, which begins March 1, 2017. The Farm Committee met recently to review the lease with tenant Jim Hampton. Jordan stated with increases in expenses and the decrease in grain prices, the Committee recommends extending the lease for another year under the current price schedule of \$175.00 per acre. (Farm lease attached to these minutes).

Hayden made a motion to extend the farm lease for another year at the current price of \$175.00 per acre. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Public Building Committee member Gergeni updated the Board that following last month's presentation by Architect Bill Utz, the Committee felt it best just to focus on the repair of the roof. The committee will continue but feels a new roof can be placed on the courthouse for \$400,000 or less.

States Attorney Vonderheide requested approval for an amendment to the Class "One" Beer liquor license to include beer, wine and alcoholic liquor for package sales. This is basically a language clean up issue, so there will be no confusion as to what an establishment with this type of license can sell.

Williams made motion to approve the Resolution. Coffman seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (17 yes, 1 no Jordan). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

At this time, Chairman Cruitt called for the County Highway Engineer's report.

Alan Spesard, County Highway Engineer, presented the Highway Engineer's Report and requested approval from the Board for four Resolutions and an Agreement. Spesard first presented a funding resolution to replace a bridge on the Dry Point/Lakewood Township lines. This is a 13T posted bridge and the estimated cost share for the County will be \$70,000, which will be state funded. The resolution ensures the County will cover their portion of the funding.

Bennett made motion to approve the funding resolution. Woodall seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

In conjunction with the resolution, Spesard presented a joint agreement between the State and County for funding the remainder of the bridge replacement costs. Funding will be 80% Federal, 16% State, the remainder will be paid equally by the townships and the County.

Bennett made motion to approve the joint funding agreement. Barr seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Shelby County Board Meeting February 8, 2017

Next, Spesard presented the annual Cold Mix Award Resolution for approval. The low bidder at the February 3rd bid letting was JTC Petroleum with a low bid of \$2.41 per gallon of oil, and also includes the pug mill and an operator to make the annual Cold Mix for the County and the Townships.

Cannon made motion to approve the Cold Mix Award Resolution. Gergeni seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no). (Resolution attached to these minutes).

Spesard requested approval for a resolution awarding the Rural Township Railroad Crossing Approach. This project will be 100% funded by a grant from the ICC. The only bidder for this job was Brad Agney Backhoe Service at \$40,873.

Lenz made motion to approve the resolution for the Rural Township Railroad Crossing. Jordan seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

The final resolution presented was to revise the resolution passed last month regarding the County Hwy Bridge on the Henton Blacktop. IDOT had requested a change in the figures. Woodall made motion to approve the revision. Cannon seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Continuing with updates, Spesard reported the County Hwy/Henton Bridge project was bid in Springfield on Feb. 3rd. The low bidder was AJ Walker at \$708,446.32. This project will be funded with 80% Federal Funds and the remaining 20% will be State funded. A bid letting was also held on Feb. 3rd for Oconee Township for rock hauling and stockpiling of rock for Holland Township. A training session for flagger certification was held on Feb. 2nd at the Highway Department. 37 people attended and the training was conducted by IDOT. Spesard reported this certification must be renewed every few years. The annual oil letting will be held on March 3rd at the Highway Department and the Dry Point/Lakewood Bridge will be let in Springfield on April 28th.

Chairman Cruitt called for committee reports. (Committee reports are attached to these minutes). Reports were given and items presented for follow-up or for public awareness are as follows:

Budget Committee member Cannon reminded the Budget committee about their meeting on February 15 at 9:00 to discuss financing of the roof repair.

As Airport committee member, Cannon reported the Airport plans on installing Jet Fuel A and will be borrowing money from the Shelby County State Bank until the IDOT grant funding for the project is received. These will be short term loans, and Steve Wempen was given authority to sign the loans and work with the State Bank regarding this matter. The United States Air Force has agreed to give the County a Jet to install at the Airport, more information on this will be shared with the Board as it becomes available. Farm income for the Airport for 2016 totaled \$40,404.96.

Animal Control Chair Jordan shared that the dog wash at the Animal Control facility generated approximately \$4,000 in revenue.

There was no Chairman correspondence.

Continuing with Chairman Appointments Cruitt requested approval for the following:

Appoint by Administrative Order, Brad Rau as Public Defender. Motion by Bennett, second by Woodall, passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).


Reappoint Bill Hampton, Zoning Board of Appeals. Motion by Woodall, second by Durbin, passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Reappoint Larry Minott, Trustee Moweaqua Fire Protection District. Motion by Jordan, second by Hayden, passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

Appoint Terry Metzger, Rescue Squad Committee. Motion by Durbin, second by Hayden, passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no).

There was no public body comment and no further business to come before the Shelby County Board.

Metzger made motion to assess mileage and per diem for the February meetings, to pay the bills/payroll as approved by the committees and adjourn until the next meeting to be held on March 8, 2017. Cannon seconded said motion, which passed by voice vote (18 yes, 0 no) and the meeting was adjourned at 9:40A.M.

IIRA Technology Project Receives Funding from Americorps*Vista Program

MACOMB, IL -- Illinois communities now have a new resource for maximizing their use of information technology as a community development tool. Up to six VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) members will be available to work in local communities thanks to a grant from AmeriCorps*VISTA. This grant will provide partial funding to the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs (IIRA) at Western Illinois University to place VISTA members in rural communities participating in the IIRA's Rural Information Technology Planning Project (RITPP).

The RITPP educates rural residents and policymakers about information technology (IT) and empowers them to make informed decisions to enhance the development of their community. VISTA is a part of the AmeriCorps national service family of programs that provide people of all ages opportunities to serve their communities for a year while earning valuable work experience and making lasting positive change. Like a domestic version of the Peace Corps, AmeriCorps*VISTA members work to develop sustainable solutions for tough issues.

SHELBY COUNTY BOARD MEETING CLOSED SESSION

July 13, 2016

The Shelby County Board met in Closed Session following a motion and roll call vote, for the statutory citation 5 ILCS 120/2(C)(11) - to discuss current litigation. State's Attorney Gina Vonderheide and Zoning Administrator Jared Rowcliffe also attended the session.

The purpose of the Closed Session was to update the Board on recent developments involving the case between Shelby County, Dave and Barb Galvin, William Curl and Mark and Carla Goodwin and the respective lawsuits against the County.

The property owners attended mediation under the guidance of retired Judge Hitpas. The parties involved were unable to come to any agreement with mediation. The Board was updated regarding a recent Court hearing held on June 20th. Several Board members attended this hearing.

The next hearing has been scheduled for August 20th. No decision is expected but Vonderheide and Rowcliffe feel certain the Judge wants to resolve this case.

Discussion followed and questions were answered by Vonderheide and Rowcliffe.

There was no further business for the Closed Session.

LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS LEASE made and entered into this 13th day of February 2013, by and between the County of Shelby, State of Illinois, ("Landowners"), represented by Robert Jordan, Jesse Durbin and Larry Lenz, County Board members and County Farm Committee members, and Jim W. Hampton, R.R.3, Shelbyville, Illinois 62565 ("Tenant").

The Landowner rents and leases to the Tenant, for agricultural purposes only, the following described REAL ESTATE, to-wit;

The Northeast Quarter (NE ¼) of Section Four (4), and the West Half of the Northwest Quarter (NW ¼) of Section Three (3), Township Elven North (11N), Range Three East (3E), of the Third (3rd) Principal Meridian, situated in the County of Shelby, State of Illinois, consisting of 196.3 acres of tillable ground.

LENGTH OF TENURE: The term of this lease shall begin on **MARCH 1, 2013,** and shall continue until **FEBRUARY 28, 2014.**

EXTENT OF AGREEMENT: Terms of this lease shall be binding on the heirs, executors, administrators, assigns or agents, for both Landowner and Tenant, in the same manner as upon the original parties.

RENT: The Tenant shall pay to the Landowner \$175.00 per acre, \$34,352.50, in two (2) equal payments of \$17,176.25. The first payment is due on April 2, 2013 but not later than April 30, 2013. The second payment is due on November 1, 2013, but no later than November 30, 2013. Failure to make either payment by the deadline is grounds for termination of the lease.

COSTS:

- 1. The Landowner agrees to pay up to two-thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) per year for necessary limestone; however, the Landowner shall have the right to have the aforementioned real estate tested to determine whether or not limestone is necessary.
- 2. The Tenant specifically agrees to pay for any and all types of fertilizer, herbicides, and seed. The Tenant also agrees to keep the cemetery, roadside, and waterways properly mowed.

LANDOWNER AGREES TO FURNISH AS HIS INVESTMENT AND EXPENSES:

- 1. The above described farm, including the fixed improvements thereon.
- 2. Materials the Landowner deems necessary for repairs and improvements on the above described farm.
- 3. Skilled labor employed in making permanent improvements.

TENANT AGREES TO FURNISH AS HIS INVESTMENT AND EXPENSES:

- 1. All machinery, equipment, power and labor necessary to farm the premises properly.
- 2. Labor, except skilled labor, required for repairs and improvements.

TENANT'S DUTIES IN OPERATING THE FARM:

- 1. To keep the farm neat, and to prevent any unnecessary waste, or damage to the property.
- 2. Not to allow noxious weeds to go to seed on said premises but to destroy same; to cut all weeds, sprouts and brush in fence rows and on roads adjoining as often as needed each year without charge to the Landowner for labor.
- 3. To investigate and repair any broken tile and keep outlets open; repair breaks in open ditches. Tenant shall not plow or disk through grass waterway, or other low places that will permit open ditches eroding across fields.
- 4. Not to burn corn stalks, cobs, straw or other residue grown on the farm, nor to remove any hay, cobs or straw or other residue, except by agreement.
- 5. To clip small grain stubble and to prevent noxious weeds from going to seed.
- 6. Not to permit tramping of rotation fields by livestock in wet weather when the soil is soft, and to prevent rooting by hogs.
- 7. The Tenant agrees to follow such crop rotation, tillage practices, fertilizer programs, conservation measures, and arrangements as are worked out with the Landowner or his Agent, for the best interest of all concerned.
- 8. Not to assign this lease to any person or persons or sublet any part of the premises without the consent of the Landowner.

ADDITIONAL AGREEMENTS:

- 1. Tenant is not to erect or permit to be erected upon said premises, any structure, building, fence or sign of any kind whatsoever, except by the written consent of the Landowner, nor to purchase any materials or incur any expenses for the account of the Landowner without his approval and will not make a claim for labor at any time unless Landowner has given written permission at a previous date.
- 2. Tenant is not to add electrical wiring, plumbing or heating without written permission of the Landowner, and when same is given such is to pass inspection of both power and insurance companies. Said additions shall immediately become part of the property against which the Tenant will have no further claim unless otherwise agreed in writing.

- 3. Nothing in this lease shall confer upon the Tenant any right to minerals underlying said land or any part thereof, but the same are hereby expressly reserved by the Landowner together with the full right, liberty and land room to them, to enter upon the premises and to bore, search and excavate for same, to work and remove the same, and to deposit excavated rubbish, and with full liberty to pass over said premises with vehicles and lay down and work any such railroad track or tracks, tanks, pipe lines, powers and structures as may be necessary or convenient for the above purpose. Said Landowner, however, agrees to deduct from the annual rent, pro-rata, for the land so taken by him or his assigns for said uses when the rental of such land is cash, and to reimburse the said Tenant for any actual damage he may suffer for crops destroyed where such land is on grain rent and to release Tenant from obligation to continue farming this property when development of resources interferes materially with Tenant's ability to make a satisfactory return.
- 4. Landowner shall in no way be liable in damages for failure of water supply or for any damage by the elements or otherwise, to any of the improvements, nor for any loss or damage while improvements are under construction or repair nor for any failure to repair or alter or replace any buildings or improvement.
- 5. Tenant takes possession of the leased premises subject to the hazards of operating a farm, and assumes all risk of accidents to himself, his family, his employees, or agents in pursuance of his farming operations, or in performing repairs to the buildings, fences and other improvements.

RIGHT OF ENTRY: The landowner or his agent shall be entitled to free access to the premises at all times and may make any repairs and improvements thereon. If this lease is terminated, the Landowner or his agent shall be entitled to fall plow, fertilize or otherwise prepare the ground and plant in proper season for the flowing year's crops.

LANDOWNER'S LIEN:

The Landowner's lien provided by law shall be the security for the rent herein specified.

If the Tenant shall, from any cause, fail to comply with all his agreements herein, the Landowner may at any time when such failure occurs after giving three days written notice of his intention to do so, take active possession of said premises and buildings thereon which the Tenant agrees to surrender, and employ other persons to tend said crop and perform all the agreements of the Tenant as herein contained as fully as the same are contemplated in this agreement and after deducting all monies advanced, or monies due for the rent and the expense of attending such crop as aforesaid, to pay the residue, if any, to the Tenant.

If the Tenant shall fail to pay the cash rent and advances, or account for the share rent as herein stipulated or shall fail to keep any of the agreements of this lease, all costs and attorney's fees of the Landowner in enforcing collection or performance, shall be added to and become a part of the obligations payable by the Tenant hereunder.

YIELDING POSSESSION: The Tenant agrees that at the expiration of the term of this lease, he will yield up possession of the premises to the Landowner without further demand or notice, in as good

order and condition as when same were entered upon by the Tenant, loss by fire or tornado, and ordinary wear excepted.

RESOLUTION NO. 2017-07

WHEREAS, the County of Shelby, State of Illinois, as heretofore enacted Liquor Control Resolutions, regulating the sale of alcoholic liquor outside of the corporate limits of any city, town or village within the County; and

WHEREAS, the Shelby County Board deems it necessary and desirable to revise and amend the Liquor Control regulations; and

WHEREAS, Shelby County Resolution No. 02-16 was enacted on July 10, 2002 to consolidate all previous Liquor Control Resolutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED THAT the Liquor Control Resolution No. 02-16 is hereby amended as follows:

- 1. Article I, Section 3 Paragraphs A- D state:
 - A. The word "ALCOHOL" means the product of distillation of any fermented liquid whether rectified or diluted, whatever may be the origin thereof, and included synthetic ethyl alcohol. It does not include denatured alcohol or wood alcohol.
 - B. The word "WINE" means any alcoholic beverage obtained by the fermentation of the natural contents of fruits or vegetables, containing sugar, including such beverages when fortified by the addition of alcohol as above defined.
 - C. The word "BEER" means a beverage obtained by alcoholic fermentation of an infusion or concoction of barley, or other grain, malt and hops in water, and includes, among other things, beer, ale, stout, lager beer, porter and the like.
 - D. The phrase "ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR" includes the three varieties of liquor above defined (alcohol, wine and beer) and every liquid or solid, patented or not, containing alcohol, wine or beer, and capable of being consumed as a beverage by a human being. The provision of this resolution shall not apply to any liquid or solid containing one-half of one percent, or less, of alcohol by volume.
- 2. Article VII, Paragraph A shall state:

COUNT

A. Class One/Beer License: A Beer One License shall entitle the licensee to sell at retail beer and alcoholic beverages in their original package or packages, seal or seals unbroken, for consumption off of the premises where sold only. The license fee of a Class One License shall be \$500.00 per annum. The Board hereby announces as its present policy the fixing of the maximum number of Class One Licenses to be fixed at three (3) per township.



THE LPA AGREES:

- (1) To acquire in its name, or in the name of the STATE if on the STATE highway system, all right-of-way necessary for this project in accordance with the requirements of Titles II and III of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, and established State policies and procedures. Prior to advertising for bids, the LPA shall certify to the STATE that all requirements of Titles II and III of said Uniform Act have been satisfied. The disposition of encroachments, if any, will be cooperatively determined by representatives of the LPA, and the STATE and the FHWA, if required.
- (2) To provide for all utility adjustments, and to regulate the use of the right-of-way of this improvement by utilities, public and private, in accordance with the current Utility Accommodation Policy for Local Agency Highway and Street Systems.
- (3) To provide for surveys and the preparation of plans for the proposed improvement and engineering supervision during construction of the proposed improvement.
- (4) To retain jurisdiction of the completed improvement unless specified otherwise by addendum (addendum should be accompanied by a location map). If the improvement location is currently under road district jurisdiction, an addendum is required.
- To maintain or cause to be maintained, in a manner satisfactory to the **STATE** and the **FHWA**, the completed improvement, or that portion of the completed improvement within its jurisdiction as established by addendum referred to in item 4 above.
- (6) To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and Federal Highway Acts pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Regulations required by the U.S. Department of Transportation.
- To maintain, for a minimum of 3 years after final project close-out by the STATE, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amounts, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract; the contract and all books, records and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General and the department; and the LPA agrees to cooperate fully with any audit conducted by the Auditor General and the STATE; and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain the books, records and supporting documents required by this section shall establish a presumption in favor of the STATE for the recovery of any funds paid by the STATE under the contract for which adequate books, records and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.
- (8) To provide if required, for the improvement of any railroad-highway grade crossing and rail crossing protection within the limits of the proposed improvement.
- (9) To comply with Federal requirements or possibly lose (partial or total) Federal participation as determined by the FHWA.
- (10) (State Contracts Only) That the method of payment designated on page one will be as follows:
 - Method A Lump Sum Payment. Upon award of the contract for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE within thirty (30) calendar days of billing, in lump sum, an amount equal to 80% of the LPA's estimated obligation incurred under this Agreement. The LPA will pay to the STATE the remainder of the LPA's obligation (including any nonparticipating costs) within thirty (30) calendar days of billing in a lump sum, upon completion of the project based on final costs.
 - Method B Monthly Payments. Upon award of the contract for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE, a specified amount each month for an estimated period of months, or until 80% of the LPA's estimated obligation under the provisions of the Agreement has been paid, and will pay to the STATE the remainder of the LPA's obligation (including any nonparticipating costs) in a lump sum, upon completion of the project based upon final costs.
 - Method C Progress Payments. Upon receipt of the contractor's first and subsequent progressive bills for this improvement, the LPA will pay to the STATE within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt, an amount equal to the LPA's share of the construction cost divided by the estimated total cost, multiplied by the actual payment (appropriately adjusted for nonparticipating costs) made to the contractor until the entire obligation incurred under this Agreement has been paid.

Failure to remit the payment(s) in a timely manner as required under Methods A, B, or C, shall allow the STATE to internally offset, reduce, or deduct the arrearage from any payment or reimbursement due or about to become due and payable from the STATE to LPA on this or any other contract. The STATE, at its sole option, upon notice to the LPA, may place the debt into the Illinois Comptroller's Offset System (15 ILCS 405/10.05) or take such other and further action as my be required to recover the debt.

- (11) (Local Contracts or Day Labor) To provide or cause to be provided all of the initial funding, equipment, labor, material and services necessary to construct the complete project.
- (12) (Preliminary Engineering) In the event that right-of-way acquisition for, or actual construction of, the project for which this preliminary engineering is undertaken with Federal participation is not started by the close of the tenth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the project is federally authorized, the LPA will repay the STATE any Federal funds received under the terms of this Agreement.
- (13) (Right-of-Way Acquisition) In the event that the actual construction of the project on this right-of-way is not undertaken by the close of the twentieth fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the project is federally authorized, the LPA will repay the STATE any Federal Funds received under the terms of this Agreement.

(14) , (Railroa ated Work Only) The estimates and general layout plans for at-grade crossing improvements be forwarded to the Rail Safety and Project Engineer, Room 204, Illinois Department of Transportation, 2300 South Dirksen Parkway, Springfield, Illinois, 62764. Approval of the estimates and general layout plans should be obtained prior to the commencement of railroad related work. All railroad related work is also subject to approval be the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC). Final inspection for railroad related work should be coordinated through appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets office.

Plans and preemption times for signal related work that will be interconnected with traffic signals shall be submitted to the ICC for review and approval prior to the commencement of work. Signal related work involving interconnects with state maintained traffic signals should also be coordinated with the IDOT's District Bureau of Operations.

The LPA is responsible for the payment of the railroad related expenses in accordance with the LPA/railroad agreement prior to requesting reimbursement from IDOT. Requests for reimbursement should be sent to the appropriate IDOT District Bureau of Local Roads and Streets office.

Engineer's Payment Estimates shall be in accordance with the Division of Cost on page one.

- (15) And certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief its officials:
 - (a) are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any Federal department or agency;
 - (b) have not within a three-year period preceding this Agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements receiving stolen property;
 - (c) are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (Federal, State, local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in item (b) of this certification; and
 - (d) have not within a three-year period preceding the Agreement had one or more public transactions (Federal, State, local) terminated for cause or default.
- (16) To include the certifications, listed in item 15 above, and all other certifications required by State statutes, in every contract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment.
- (17) (State Contracts) That execution of this agreement constitutes the LPA's concurrence in the award of the construction contract to the responsible low bidder as determined by the STATE.
- (18) That for agreements exceeding \$100,000 in federal funds, execution of this Agreement constitutes the LPA's certification that:
 - (a) No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or any employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement;
 - (b) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress, in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying", in accordance with its instructions;
 - (c) The LPA shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all ties (including subcontracts, subgrants and contracts under grants, loans and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- (19) To regulate parking and traffic in accordance with the approved project report.
- (20) To regulate encroachments on public right-of-way in accordance with current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- (21) To regulate the discharge of sanitary sewage into any storm water drainage system constructed with this improvement in accordance with current Illinois Compiled Statutes.
- To complete this phase of the project within three (3) years from the date this agreement is approved by the **STATE** if this portion of the project described in the Project Description does not exceed \$1,000,000 (five years if the project costs exceed \$1,000,000).
- (23) To comply with the federal Financial Integrity Review and Evaluation (FIRE) program, which requires States and subrecipients to justify continued federal funding on inactive projects. 23 CFR 630.106(a)(5) defines an inactive project as a project which no expenditures have been charged against Federal funds for the past twelve (12) months.
 - To keep projects active, invoicing must occur a minimum of one time within any given twelve (12) month period. However, to ensure adequate processing time, the first invoice shall be submitted to the **STATE** within six (6) months of the federal authorization date. Subsequent invoices will be submitted in intervals not to exceed six (6) months.
- The LPA will submit supporting documentation with each request for reimbursement from the STATE. Supporting documentation is defined as verification of payment, certified time sheets or summaries, vendor invoices, vendor receipts, cost plus fix fee invoice, progress report, and personnel and direct cost summaries.and other documentation supporting the requested reimbursement amount (Form BLRS 05621 should be used for consultant invoicing purposes). If a final invoice is not received within this time frame, the most recent invoice may be considered the final invoice and the obligation of the funds closed.

- (25) The LPA shall provide the final report to the appropriate STATE district within twelve months of the physical completion date of the project so that the report may be audited and approved for payment. If the deadline cannot be met, a written explanation must be provided to the district prior to the end of the twelve months documenting the reason and the new anticipated date of completion. If the extended deadline is not met, this process must be repeated until the project is closed. Failure to follow this process may result in the immediate close-out of the project and loss of further funding.
- (26) (Single Audit Requirements) That if the LPA expends \$750,000 or more a year in federal financial assistance they shall have an audit made in accordance with 2 CFR 200. LPAs expending less than \$750,000 a year shall be exempt from compliance. A copy of the audit report must be submitted to the STATE (Office of Finance and Administration, Audit Coordination Section, 2300 South Dirksen Parkway, Springfield, Illinois, 62764), within 30 days after the completion of the audit, but no later than one year after the end of the LPA's fiscal year. THE STATE AGREES:

- (1) To provide such guidance, assistance and supervision and to monitor and perform audits to the extent necessary to assure validity of the LPA's certification of compliance with Titles II and III requirements.
- (2) (State Contracts) To receive bids for the construction of the proposed improvement when the plans have been approved by the **STATE** (and **FHWA**, if required) and to award a contract for construction of the proposed improvement, after receipt of a satisfactory bid.
- (3) (Day Labor) To authorize the LPA to proceed with the construction of the improvement when Agreed Unit Prices are approved, and to reimburse the LPA for that portion of the cost payable from Federal and/or State funds based on the Agreed Unit Prices and Engineer's Payment Estimates in accordance with the Division of Cost on page one.
- (4) (Local Contracts) For agreements with Federal and/or State funds in engineering, right-of-way, utility work and/or construction work:
 - (a) To reimburse the LPA for the Federal and/or State share on the basis of periodic billings, provided said billings contain sufficient cost information and show evidence of payment by the LPA;
 - (b) To provide independent assurance sampling, to furnish off-site material inspection and testing at sources normally visited by **STATE** inspectors of steel, cement, aggregate, structural steel and other materials customarily tested by the **STATE**.

IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED:

- (1) Construction of the project will utilize domestic steel as required by Section 106.01 of the current edition of the Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction and federal Buy America provisions.
- (2) That this Agreement and the covenants contained herein shall become null and void in the event that the **FHWA** does not approve the proposed improvement for Federal-aid participation within one (1) year of the date of execution of this Agreement.
- (3) This Agreement shall be binding upon the parties, their successors and assigns.
- For contracts awarded by the LPA, the LPA shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of any USDOT assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR part 26. The LPA shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of USDOT assisted contracts. The LPA's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR part 26 and as approved by USDOT, is incorporated by reference in this Agreement. Upon notification to the recipient of its failure to carry out its approved program, the STATE may impose sanctions as provided for under part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for

enforce under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31U.S.C. 3801 (a)). In the absence of a USDOT – approved LPA DBE Program or on State awarded contracts, this Agreement shall be adminisced under the provisions of the STATE's USDOT approved Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program.

- (5) In cases where the **STATE** is reimbursing the **LPA**, obligations of the **STATE** shall cease immediately without penalty or further payment being required if, in any fiscal year, the Illinois General Assembly or applicable Federal Funding source fails to appropriate or otherwise make available funds for the work contemplated herein.
- (6) All projects for the construction of fixed works which are financed in whole or in part with funds provided by this Agreement and/or amendment shall be subject to the Prevailing Wage Act (820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq.) unless the provisions of that Act exempt its application.







Dispatchers from the 911 call center in Taylorville will start to ride along with Shelby County Deputies this month to learn the County. 911 Coordinator Mickey Earhart has been meeting with area Fire Departments to clarify call out protocol and address "no mans land" areas in the County.

Sheriff Koonce has traded two old unused cargo trailers the Sheriff's Office owned for one lightweight aluminum trailer that we be more user friendly. The transaction was an even trade.

The Detention Center has recently been upgraded with two new air conditioner units. This makes three new units in the last 6 months. There is still one more unit in the Jail that will have to be replaced soon.

The Sheriff's Office has hired a new Supplemental Correctional Officer. Dalton Gatton of Shelbyville. Dalton will replace John Gano whom his returning to his previous employment.

The Detention Center Inmate population has risen over the last couple of months to an average of 24.

Sheriff Koonce has recently made a purchase of 14 firearms specifically Kel Tek sub 2000's The new firearms will be issued to each Deputy and used as companion to the Deputies Side arms. They will fill the gap between the Deputies Pistol and Assault Rifle. The weapons were purchased with grant money earmarked for this use.

lpreo estimates volume for the week at \$8.9 billion, up from a revised \$8.2 billion of supply in the past week, according to updated figures from Thomson Reuters. The calendar is composed of \$7.4 billion of negotiated deals and \$1.5 billion of competitive sales.

"Demand may slow a little next week renewed worries about Fed policies and interest rates," said Dan Heckman, senior fixed income strategist at U.S. Bank Wealth Management. "It does appear that there is a lot of cash on the sidelines, waiting for the right deals to come."

Goldman Sachs is expected to price the city of Chicago's \$1.16 billion of taxable and tax-exempt general obligation bonds.

The underwriter said the sale will be on Wednesday or Thursday, as the taxable part and tax-exempts will come on separate days.

The deal is rated BBB-plus by S&P Global Ratings and Kroll Bond Rating Agency and BBB-minus by Fitch Ratings.

"I think there will be some demand for the Chi-

cago deal, but it will really come down to how it is priced; it has to be cheap enough," Heekman said. "There is still a lot of risk in that name, and until the political log jams free up, it will be a challenge. It has to be priced in a way that it can bring enough return to outweigh any potential future risks.

There will be a taxable portion for \$11,635 million and a \$345.07 million tax exempt part. The 10-year benchmark muni general obligation yield rose one basis point to 2.16% on Friday from 2.15% on Thursday, while the yield on the 30-year GO increased three

basis points to 2.91% from 2.88%, according to Municipal Market Data's triple-A scale.

The yield on the two-year Treasury rose to 1.19% from 1.17% on Thursday, while the 10-year Treasury yield increased to 2.38% from 2.35%, and the yield on the 30-year Treasury bond gained to 2.98% from 2.95%.

Some of the most actively traded issues by type in the week ended Jan, 13 were from Texas, California and Pennsylvania, according to Markit.

In the GO bond sector, the Ysleta ISD, Texas, 5s of 2046 were traded 30 times. In the revenue bond sector, the Los Angeles Department of Airports 5s of 2041 were traded 55 times. And in the taxable bond sector, the University of Pittsburgh 3.646s of 2036 were traded 32 times. Illinois, Pennsylvania and New Jersey names were among the most actively quoted bonds in the week ended Jan. 13, according to Markit,

On the bid side, the Illinois taxable 6.63s of 2035 were quoted by 38 unique dealers.

On the ask side, the Pennsylvania GO 4s of 2034 were quoted by 229 unique dealers. And among two-sided quotes, the New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund taxable 5.754s of 2028 were quoted by 18 unique dealers.

We understand the County is studying the possibility of issuing Bonds for projects within the County. We appreciate the opportunity to be of service to you as you explore various types of financing.

The following is a brief review of some of the questions you may have in regard to your financing options. We hope you find this report a useful tool as you proceed with your projects.

1. Who and What is First Midstate?

2. What is the Debt Limit of a County?

A County is limited in the number of Bonds it can issue based on the County's legal debt limit. The general statutory debt limit for Counties with a population under 500,000 is 2.875% of the County's Equalized Assessed Valuation (EAV). However, the Local Government Debt Limitation Act of the State of Illinois provides that debt incurred for the purpose of building county court houses, jails, and other necessary county buildings, and to provide furniture, rooms and offices for the county circuit court, county board, State's attorney, county clerk, county treasurer, recorder, sheriff and clerks of the court may be issued without regard to the 2.875% debt limit.

Under certain circumstances, Counties are subject to another statutory debt limitation. Counties are authorized to issue *referendum-approved bonds* when deemed necessary by the County Board to enable the County Board to perform any duties imposed upon it by law, as long as the amount does not exceed, including the then existing indebtedness of the County, 5.75% of the County's EAV. In other words, the County's total indebtedness including the proposed Bonds may not exceed the legal limit of 5.75% of the County's last certified EAV.

The following are your County's EAV figures for the last three years.

Note that for debt limit and bonding capacity calculations a County's total EAV figures are taken into consideration including Tax Increment Finance (TIF) or Enterprise Zone (EZ) district values. However, for purposes of calculating the tax rate for a County, any EAV directly attributed to the TIF and EZ is not included.

3. What are Referendum G. O. Bonds?

Bonds that require the approval of the voters in a County and are secured by a levy of a direct annual tax on all taxable property in the County are referendum approved General Obligation bonds. These taxes can be levied without limit as to rate or amount or may have to be restricted to a particular rate.

The County Board must enter an order of record specifying the amount of bonds required and the purpose for issuance. The County Board certifies the question of issuing the bonds to the applicable election authority who submits the question to the voters at any election in accordance with the general election law. The *next potential referendum date* under the present consolidated election system *would be March 20, 2018*. In order to place a General Obligation Bond question on this ballot, the County Board will *need to adopt an election ordinance* initiating the question *on or before January 2, 2018*. In addition, the elections of public officials as well as all special purposes including your proposed issue will be held at the same polling places on the same date as all other necessary referenda for any other public body in your County, area or precinct.

If the bonds will be paid from property taxes which will exceed the taxes that are authorized to be levied by the County Board without referendum, the County Board must set forth substantially the amount of such excess required, the purpose and the number of years the excess will be required to be levied and submit the question of assessing the additional tax rate to the voters at the next election for county officers. The County Board then certifies the question to the proper election authority who submits the proposition at a general election in accordance with the general election law.

If a County Board determines to issue referendum bonds and levy a tax in excess of the statutory limits, then the County may submit both questions to voters at the same election and may include both questions in one ballot proposition.

4. What are Alternate Bonds?

Enactment of the Local Government Debt Reform Act (the "Act"), as supplemented and amended provides County Boards a type of Bond issue which combines many of the advantages of Revenue Bonds and General Obligation Bonds. Alternate Bonds or "double-barreled" Bonds are General Obligation Bonds that are payable from enterprise system revenues or another revenue source, or both. In addition, the general obligation (property tax) acts as a back-up security for the Bonds if revenues are insufficient. These Bonds do not have to mature within 20 years as do General Obligation Bonds.

Unlike traditional Revenue Bonds, Alternate Bonds do not require the establishment and regular funding of restricted use reserve accounts.

The following conditions must be met before Alternate Bonds may be issued:

- a) The Bonds must be issued for a lawful purpose.
- Alternate Bonds are subject to a backdoor referendum. The County Board must adopt a referencum stating its intention to issue the Bonds and publish that ordinance in the newspaper customarily used for publication purposes. If there is no petition signed by at least 7-1/2% of the registered voters of the County and filed with the County Clerk within 30 days after publication, then the Bonds may be issued without referendum.
- c) It must be determined that there will be sufficient revenues to pay the maximum annual debt service plus an additional 25% coverage factor at the time the Bonds are issued.
- d) The County must pledge to use the indicated revenues for the payment of the Bonds. Alternate Bonds do not count against your General Obligation debt limit as long as they are retired from the pledged revenues and no property tax is extended to repay the Bonds.

5. What are Debt Certificates?

Counties can issue Debt Certificates (the "Certificates") evidencing their repayment obligation under an Installment Contract which can be sold similar to a Bond. The payments due on the Certificates are a lawful direct general obligation of the County payable from the operating funds of the County. There is no separate levy available for the purpose of making such payments. Once the Certificates are issued, the money is held by the County in the "Project Fund" and is used to pay the costs of constructing, improving, or acquiring the facilities or land under the installment contract. In a construction project, the County can maintain significant control over the investment and disbursement of the project funds that it would normally have with a bond issue. The outstanding principal amount of the Certificates does count against the County's debt limit.

The Certificates may be issued based upon the architect's preliminary plans and estimates. Final drawings and bids need not be done before the Certificates are issued.

6. What are Public Building Commission Bonds?

Pursuant to the Public Building Commission Act, as amended, counties are authorized to create public building commissions ("PBCs") for the purpose of assisting counties in the construction, acquisition, improvement, replacement, and operation of public buildings and facilities, if approved by referendum. The PBC is authorized to issue lease revenue bonds and use the bond proceeds to finance the county's project. To accomplish the financing, the PBC takes legal title to the county's buildings and facilities that are being constructed and improved

with bond proceeds. The PBC leases such buildings and facilities to the county. The county then levies a tax upon all taxable property in the county to provide for the lease rental payments to the PBC. The PBC issues revenue bonds payable from the lease rental payments made by the county. This financing method may be of limited use to counties subject to the Extension Limitation Law, as such counties cannot levy a new tax without referendum approval in order to make such lease rental payments to the PBC. For counties that are not subject to the Extension Limitation Law, however, a tax unlimited as to rate or amount may be levied by the county upon all taxable property to provide for the lease rental payments to the PBC.

Bonds issued by a PBC are Revenue Bonds (non-referendum) supported by the underlying entities' lease payments, as the PBC has no direct taxing authority. The lease will need to define (i) who is utilizing which parts of the project(s) to be financed; (ii) to what extent each party will be responsible for a potential default by the other party; (iii) whether each should levy 100% of the annual principal and interest payments or 50% and; (iv) whether or not to levy a modest contingency of approximately 10% coverage to make the Revenue Bonds more marketable. Each entity could then decide whether the property tax levy should then be extended or abated each year. Also, it is customary in this type of project to include minimal administrative expenses of the PBC in the annual lease requirement. Such expenses might include legal, insurance, audit publication and appraisal, in addition to principal and interest. Operating expenses could also be included.

7. How will the Bond Notification Act affect the proposed issue?

House Bill 2695 which passed the Legislature during the 1996 session and was updated by Senate Bill 932 during the 1999 session, requires that a public hearing be held for most non-referendum Bond issues prior to adopting the final Bond ordinance. Some of the highlights of the Bond Issue Notification Act, as amended, include:

- The hearing required under the Act may be set by the County or the Chairman.
- The notice of the hearing must be published at least 7 days but no more than 30 days ahead of the date of the hearing.
- The notice of the hearing must be posted at least 48 hours before the hearing at the principal office of the County.
- The hearing may be at a regular or special meeting of the County.
- The final Bond ordinance may not be acted on for at least 7 days following the conclusion of the hearing.

8. How will a Bond Issue Affect the Tax Rate?

In order to have a clear picture of what a Bond issue might do to your County's tax rate, it might be helpful to review the County's previous years tax rates.

ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER NO. 2017-1

WHEREAS, the Circuit Judges of the Fourth Judicial Circuit Court have appointed Bradford Rau Public Defender of Shelby County, for the period from January 17, 2017, through August 31, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Judge has administrative authority to establish the terms and conditions under which the Public Defender shall perform his duties of office.

WHEREFORE IT IS ORDERED, that the terms and conditions under which the Public Defender in Shelby County shall perform his duties of office are as follows:

I. <u>DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES</u>

- A) The Public Defender shall represent those individuals who are designated by the Court to receive the service of the Public Defender's Office of Shelby County pursuant to 55 ILCS 5/3-4006. The Public Defender shall be available to represent said individuals at all times that court is in session in Shelby County. Should a conflict of interest in representation of a defendant arise, the Public Defender's Office shall petition the court to withdraw from said representation.
- B) The Public Defender is employed in a full-time capacity and shall not engage in private practice. The Public Defender shall comply with normal office hours when the courthouse is open and as followed by other county employees. It is understood that the Public Defender must investigate cases, perform legal research, visit incarcerated prisoners, and perform other responsibilities of the position that may require work outside the court and, at times, beyond normal office hours. It is understood that the Public Defender will be available at all times required by the court in the exercise of duties.

- C) The Public Defender shall represent those defendants remanded to the Illinois Department of Corrections on their post-conviction petitions pursuant to 725 ILCS 5/122-1, as the Public Defender may be appointed by the court.
- D) The Public Defender and any Conflict Public Defenders shall keep a time sheet for each indigent represented, accurate to the nearest one-fourth (1/4) hour. The Public Defender and Conflict Public Defenders shall be prepared to submit hours expended representing indigents in order for the Court to require defendants to reimburse the county for the services provided.

II. TERM AND TERMINATION

- A) The term of this Order shall be from January 17, 2017, through August 31, 2017. It is further provided that this Order shall be subject to termination upon cancellation of the appointment by a majority of the Circuit Judges of the Fourth Judicial Circuit with or without cause. Upon termination or cancellation, all rights and duties of the Public Defender and Shelby County under this Order shall cease to exist. The Public Defender shall have the right to terminate his or her appointment upon 60 days notice to both the Chief Judge and the Chairman of the County Board.
- B) The Public Defender must apply for reappointment by written notification to the Chief Judge of the Fourth Judicial Circuit and to the Resident Circuit Judge residing in Shelby County at least 90 days prior to the termination of this Order. In the event the Public Defender is reappointed by a majority of the Circuit Judges, such renewal shall be for a period of one year.

III. COMPENSATION AND EXPENSES

- A) For the purpose of compensation, the Public Defender of Shelby County shall be considered to be a full-time employee of Shelby County at a salary equal to 90% of the current salary of the Shelby County State's Attorney on the first day of this appointment. The salary shall be payable in intervals as determined by Shelby County. This salary is contingent upon the State of Illinois reimbursing to Shelby County 66 2/3% of this annual Public Defender's salary as set forth in 55 ILCS 5/3-4007. In the event the state does not pay that amount, then the salary of the Public Defender and other terms and conditions of the position shall be renegotiated.
- B) In the event the Public Defender deems it necessary to employ the services of a private investigator, licensed physician, psychologist, psychiatrist, or

other expert witness during the course of representation of persons pursuant to the order, the Public Defender must first apply to the Circuit Court for approval of such employment by written motion in said case with copy to the State and can employ such persons only after judicial approval is obtained. After such approval is obtained, the Public Defender shall not be liable for payment of such services or expenses related directly thereto, but payment, pursuant to submission of a proper bill, voucher and Order of the Circuit Court, shall be made by Shelby County.

C) Clerical and office expense incurred shall be in accordance with the budget appropriation approved by the Shelby County Board.

IV. OUTSIDE SERVICES

- A) This Order and payment hereunder does not encompass appointments by the Court for representation of defendants remanded to the Illinois Department of Corrections or to a similar correctional institution for the purpose of proceedings of the following nature.
 - i. Pursuit of appeal beyond the perfecting of appeal by preparation and filing of Notice of Appeal, Docketing Statement, and related Notices in cases where the State Appellate Defender prosecutes the appeal.
 - ii. Pursuit of any federal remedy of a post-conviction or civil rights nature.

This appointment is effective January 17, 2017.

WHEREAS, the Board does approve such appointment of Larry Minott, as Trustee of the Moweaqua Community Fire Protection District.


